AGM NOTICE

The PHAA AGM will held on Sunday 23rd April in the Lecture Theatre at AELEC commencing at 6.00 pm. Light refreshments will be provided at the conclusion with the Annual High Points Awards Night following on.

You will receive mail out shortly in relation to Board positions and proposed Rule Changes.

APPROVED SHOW POINTS ENTRY

When you compete at a PHAA approved event, the club running the show is responsible for submitting results to the PHAA on your behalf. The club has 30 days to submit these results, so your points may not appear online right away. If you believe the results are incorrect when have been entered by the PHAA please contact the club directly as all changes must be made in writing by the Show Secretary. It is still a good idea to keep a record of your placings in your points book should you need to refer to the results if there are any issues with your them. You are also welcome to send these results into the office for file.

COMPETING, COLLECTING POINTS!

The PHAA Rule book clearly outlines classes that are eligible for points as not all classes you compete in at a Show, Pony Club, Ag Show etc are eligible.

What IS eligible to gain points

In the first instance check out our Rule Book under Rule 217 (A) where all Classes are listed under a Category. These Categories are linked to our Annual High Point and Lifetime Awards.

PHAA awards points for many events, but does the division I compete in gain points?

The most common break up of classes we see at our "Western Performance" shows is 2-Year-Old, Junior Horse and Senior Horse, provided the event is listed in the Categories List in the PHAA Rulebook (Rule 217), points will be awarded to these divisions. Hacking, Dressage, Cutting, Campdrafting and many other events do not use this break-up for divisions. As a rule of thumb, if the event has been broken into divisions, provided there is a division for everyone to enter, you will get points. However, where there are limited divisions, and divisions that are dictated by the individual club's rules, points will not be awarded. Some examples of this would be Improver, Beginner, Walk & Trot (Adult).

What's NOT eligible to gain points

Some classes that we regularly see on show programs that are not eligible for points are: - Best Presented, Best Educated, Tobiano & Overo Colour Class, Open Showmanship, All Age Led Trail, Beginner or Improver classes and Adult Walk/Jog Classes. Open Western Breed Halter, Members Only Classes and Western Horse Registry classes are also ineligible for points. It is a good idea to list the results for all of the events you enter at the show on your official results sheet to ensure you receive all eligible points and as a general record for yourself.

How Many points do I get?

For all regular shows regardless of the class of the show (A & B) points are calculated using the scale below. You are awarded points based not just on your placing in the class but also in relation to the number of horses competing in your class. Points are doubled for State Shows and Prestige shows and tripled for the PHAA National Show. If you compete at a Multi Judge show you must record your placings for each judge separately.

The posting of the 2017 National Show draft program on to the Association's Facebook page and website created some healthy discussions and received many comments. The original draft was drawn with several changes in mind. I had spoken to quite a few competitors at the 2016 National Show to ask their opinions on potential changes and ways to improve the running of the show. The ideas from these conversations were put to the Board as a whole, and changes to the 2016 program made, producing the draft version.

The comments made of the Association's Facebook page, along with the requests of three members that followed procedure and wrote directly to the Board, allowed the Board to reconsider and revamp the program. The changes made to the draft for the final program have taken into consideration the requests and comments of members, time available each day and other logistical issues. Some changes were possible, some were not.

The Board feels that our National Futurities need a boost, numbers have not improved for quite some time and the Board would like to see the Futurity events grow and again be a feature of our show that will attract spectators, new members and more competitors.

By having the Futurity events as a stand alone show with a single judge should reduce costs and increase payouts. It should also allow better promotion and hopefully in future major or corporate sponsorship of our National Futurity Show.

The National Show will be judged by two APHA judges, and two Australian judges used for the Hacking and Dressage events.

I wish all competitors safe travel and a fun and successful show. Consider how your 2017 show runs and after you return home please forward any constructive ideas or suggestions you may have through to the Board.

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Proposed New Rules

Rule 240 Ride Australia Program

AWARDS Add 250 Hours

Rule 237B MASTERS AMATEUR

Amend to read First Paragraph

PHAA members who qualify under Rule 237 as an Amateur, will be considered a Masters Amateur from the date of their 50th birthday. Proof of age will be required on application by providing a copy of Drivers License or Birth Certificate.

And add after Paragraph 7

All points accrued from competing in Amateur or Masters Amateur Classes will be compiled under the Masters Amateur title.

For noting in relation to awards for Ride Australia & Lifetime points: Rule 240 Ride Australia

Current rewards amended as follows and Certificates printed on quality paper reflective of award

50 hours - Certificate

100 hours - Certificate and Cap

250 hours - Certificate & Polo shirt

500 hours - Certificate & Rug

1000 hours - Certificate & Vest

For Noting in relation to:

Recognition of Lifetime points to be reflective of similar awards such as ride Australia

Certificates printed on quality paper reflective of award

50 points – Certificate 100 points Century – Certificate and Cap

300 points Superior All round - Certificate & Polo shirt

500 points – Certificate & Rug 1000 points – Certificate & Vest

PHAA RULE BOOK

A new Show and Performance Rule Book has been approved in principle by the Board. Adopting the Australian AQHA Rule Book (Show & Performance sections) as the base for our own rules will help to bring our PHAA approved shows in line with AQHA and put an end to the confusion faced by our competitors. The new rules should eliminate the current problems at shows with tack and attire, confusion with the class procedures and general showing rules.

There are additions that appear in the new PHAA Show & Performance Rules that are unique to PHAA, preserving our identity. Mainly events that are not part of the AQHA rules, such as the Decathlon. The current PHAA Rules that are in place for other matters (registration, membership, etc) and are not affected by the addition of the Show & Performance Rules.




I have been professionally breaking horses for approximately seven years and I started breaking horses when I was 15 working with a professional breaker and working with my father, breaking in the family bred horses.



Major's Treatment GET BACK ON YOUR FEET LITTLE MAN

For 11 long months I waited patiently for our beautiful Paint mare LK Ima Awesome Miracle (Maxine) to foal. I was greeted at 5am on the 10-11-16 by a gorgeous red dun colt, which we named Major. Exactly what we had been hoping for. We were so excited to have this pretty boy finally here. He is by Karalinga Double Exposure one of my favourite stallions and proudly owned by Lucy Thornton.

On the 17-11-16, just seven days after being born, I was watching Major playing games running back and forth past the yards. I was getting ready to go out and as I drove out, I saw Major lying near the shed and his mum and thought nothing of it.

I was home four hours later and noticed Major in the same position, so I diligently went over to him (heart in hand, as you do) and soon realised, that he had hurt himself and couldn't get up. I helped him up, as clearly he had not had a drink for a while. After letting him have a much needed drink and studying his actions we pinpointed it to being either hip or patella injury. Poor little man was in a world of pain and could not bear any weight at all on his offside back leg. Major couldn't get up on his own without a massive struggle, so I went out every hour or so and lifted his backend for him. He was put on a small amount of bute paste and ulcer guard. I also covered his whole backend in TUFFROC.

As I couldn't float him at this stage for x-rays and the vet said to just monitor him for now, I rang my good friend Katrina Nicole and asked for some advice and help. Katrina promptly arrived the following day and we taped him. One of Katrina's many effective and pain free ways of treating animals.

The very next day Major's leg from his point of hip through to his hock was triple the size. I started red light therapy on all of his points in conjunction with the tapping and TUFFROC to help with pain and swelling.

The vets said it was time to bring him in, as we were only guessing at what sort of injury it was. His x-rays didn't reveal any obvious breaks, but it was thought that he may have a fracture in the growth plate



in his patella, but as he is so young its impossible to tell as the growth plates themselves look like road maps at this age.

I went back to doing what I was doing three times a day. All the while on an unhandled foal that happily took everything in his stride. I think he knew we were helping him, as he was never hard to grab or treat and would whinny to me as I approached to help him up and after his drink would come straight back to me and lie down again. He was getting sore, as he could only lie on his good side so he had plenty of massages too. Such a well natured colt!!!

Major continued to improve week after week and is now able to finally trot (he couldn't do this action at all) sometimes he would attempt a little buck, but on landing, would wish he hadn't by the look on his face.

Today Major is enjoying a paddock instead of a yard and gallops, bucking like a trooper. He is totally healed and enjoying life as it should be.

TREATMENT OF MAJOR BY KATRINA NICOLE

Libby phoned me with concerns to Major's leg and asked if I could come to view him. I have been Libby's Equine Therapist for some time now with my business operating for seven years - Katrina's Equine Therapy.

As a certified practitioner of Emmett Therapy, Therapeutic Acupuncture, Photonic (red light) Therapy, Kinesiology Taping (Equi-Tape) and integrating Myofascial, Cranial and Stretches into treatments, Libby felt I could do some good.

I knew this would be a tricky case given that Major was only days old and wasn't halter broken, although Libby had handled Major daily. We still needed to do something until the vet could diagnose the problem with radiographs so we had a clear understanding if there was a permeant injury.

After assessing Major, he presented with non-weight bearing, hypertrophy to the offside hind leg, with patella as biggest area of concern and swelling continuing to hock and fetlock.

My first choice would have been to apply a patella (stifle) support taping, but due to circumstances of age, limited attention span of foal, I felt this would not be practical. Instead I choose the following photonic light therapy and taping using the (less is more approach) as not to stress Major or the dam.

Photonic Therapy and Kinesiology Taping, these being the least invasive for a new foal. Libby had already applied a favourite of mine Tuffrock Poultice to the whole leg area a couple of days prior. That was already cleaned off and we were ready to work on Major.

I applied two strip tapings along the back — longissimus dorsi muscles — these were applied to help with muscle relaxation. A fan taping to increase circulation of blood and lymph to aide in the decrease of swelling to gluteal, tensor fascia latae and biceps femoris muscles. I applied a second fan taping targeting the long and lateral digital extensor muscles, tendons and hock as the best method to cover as much area as possible to help decrease the swellings. I used the photonic light on the back, swellings, rump and ting points (above the coronet band).

All of this was completed in less than ten minutes. Libby continued with red light therapy and the tape to stay on as long as possible.

Much to our delight the red light therapy and tape had worked its amazing magic in as little as six hours, Libby had observed the swelling to the hock and fetlock had all but disappeared. For those not familiar I have included a small brief of Photonic (red light) Therapy and Kinesiology Taping.

Photonic (Red Light) Therapy:

This utilises red light of a specific nanometer (660nm) range to clear and balance Qi of the horse, in an effect to promote health by stimulating acupuncture points under the skin without the need for needles or pressure. Photonic helps with pain relief, decreases swelling and inflammation.

The action of laser light on tissue is quite similar to photosynthesis in plants. Photons of light from a laser penetrate deeply into tissue and power the synthesis of adenosine triphosphate (ATP). ATP is a molecule that is a major carrier of energy from one reaction site to another in all living cells. Increases in ATP as a result of laser light increases the energy available to the cell so that the cell can take in nutrients faster and get rid of waste products quicker. Healing wounds and cuts quickly a great tool for every stable.

Kinesiology Taping:

This is a two-way stretch latex free tape that has the ability to interact with the skin and associated neurosensory and mechanoreceptors. This aids in decompressing the tissue which, increases blood and lymph flow and impacting pain receptors, benefits of taping increases oxygen supply and circulation to an area helping inflammation and associated pain, reduces fatigue, supports muscles and joints. There are many different applications depending if your taping for Therapeutic (recovery or rehab, relaxation, Joint support, swelling) – Training (support, assist or Biomechanical) or combination.

Kinesiology taping positively influences the body on many levels which effectively supports and improves performance, regeneration and healing via endogenous processes. This can help the body recover its balance alone or in a combination with other therapies.

The Up and Down of Trot Diagonals ...

The thought of having to pick up the correct trot diagonal in a pattern can do some riders heads in, however it shouldn't. Let me break down the age old Trot Diagonal to hopefully help you in your next Equitation Pattern!

As a starting point, I like to get my students to practice at the walk and I like to focus on one direction at a time. To help the rider "see" the outside shoulder move, I like to mark the outside shoulder with some chalk. This assists in the rider glancing down to see the shoulder movement briefly. "Glancing" is the key word here as staring down too long will change the riders weight/balance in the saddle, which in turn can unbalance your horse.

While you are glancing down, verbalise what you can see, "forward, backward" etc. Then match your rising to this, rising from the saddle as you say forward and sitting down as you say backwards. Remembering to lower yourself gently down into the saddle.

As you find yourself able to rise and sit in rhythm with the outside shoulder at the walk, you can ask the horse to move up into a trot. Once trotting, repeat the same exercise by verbalising when you see the outside shoulder come forward and time your rising and sitting with your voice (forward, back).

Do not forget that you must always watch the outside shoulder so when changing direction you need to sit for two beats and then rise and switch to watching the other shoulder. With practice you should find the movement easy to spot and only need to glance down for a second.

Like all things horses, learning your diagonals is all about timing, feel and consistency. Keep persisting, as it will get easier! Below are a few quick trouble shooting ideas to keep you on track



Staring down too long will change the riders weight/balance in the saddle.





Mark the shoulder with some chalk to hellp visualise the movement of the shoulder.





UP

Rise and sit in rhythm with the outside shoulder at the walk.

DOWN







When changing direction you need to sit for two beats and then rise.









CORRECT DIAGONAL

Rising with the outside leg sitting with the inside leg.





Trouble Shooting Tips

- I. If you have trouble picking up the correct diagonal to start with it helps to sit for the first three trot beats glancing at the shoulder and then starting to rise. This trick is not infallible but does often help!
- 2. Have someone watch you when you're riding and have them tell you when the outside shoulder comes forward.
- 3. Breathe!!!When we're trying to master a new skill, we can get so caught up with the task at hand that we forget to breathe!
- 4. When you're in the show pen, glance down to check your diagonal, if it's wrong, sit for two beats and start rising again.
- 5. Practicing "feeling" your diagonals. Ask for the trot with your eyes closed (making sure you're in a safe area), once your horse is trotting and your posting to the trot, glance down and check.

Most of all have fun! Don't sweat the small stuff, just know that we're all on this learning journey together. We all started out somewhere and it's with persistence and consistency that we progress.



As we start the new year and the show season is becoming more demanding, some extra information and handy tips can help you prepare your horse for the upcoming events and give that final edge to his performance. Ensuring that your horse remains healthy, looks amazing and performs at his best through-out the show season is a big task and requires careful management.

This article will cover nutritional and veterinary advice on topics such as travel stress, heat stress, nervous behaviour and coat conditioning, which are all important aspects to consider when preparing to compete your show horse.

Travel Stress

Many owners know and adhere to the general rules of travelling horses for long distance events. It is important to include plenty of rest stops at intervals of least every 4-6 hours, and during rest stops, the horse should be unloaded and walked for 10-15 minutes to help with limb and hoof circulation. We advise that a small portion of dampened lucerne hay, fed at ground level during each rest stop, will encourage drainage of inhaled road and hay dust from the lungs and keep your horse more content during the journey. It is also important to offer water at each stop to ensure continued hydration. Do not transport horses that have any signs of respiratory illness, such as an elevated temperature above 38.5° C, depression or loss of appetite prior to travel, as they are more likely to develop 'travel sickness' or a pleuropneumonia related chest infection.

However, travelling stress affects many horses, and may be apparent by a horse's reduced performance during their event. When travelling for extended periods, it is important to tie the horse with enough room so that he can lower his head below chest level which drains their airways and reduces fluid build-up in the lungs. Horses with a build-up of fluid in the chest cavity can develop severe respiratory symptoms that may lead to infection. This fluid builds-up when the horse is not able to lower its head below chest height as it prevents the airways from their natural draining and cleaning function. A horse that is unable to lower its head for more than four hours whilst travelling will accumulate a lot of fluid within the lungs, between

2-4 litres on average over a four hours trip. This fluid will then reduce the oxygen uptake from the lungs and affect performance when they arrive to start the event or show.

Acid reflux can also be a concern during and after travel as the gastric acid in the empty stomach can splash onto the stomach lining, causing acid burn or erosion of the delicate upper stomach areas that are not protected from acid damage. This problem may be compounded by lunging or working a horse soon after travelling (in order to loosen stiffness or remove fluid that has 'stocked-up' in the lower limbs) because exercising a horse on an empty stomach is a well-known risk factor for the development of gastric ulcers. Feeding lucerne hay before, during and after travel will help to reduce this problem. An even more effective way to help normal digestive function during travelling is to add Kohnke's Own® Gastro-Coat® to a small feed of lightly dampened lucerne chaff (approx. 5 litres of lucerne chaff and 5 scoops of Gastro-Coat® for a 500 kg horse). This combination will help gastric buffering to reduce acid burn, maintain normal gastric function and keep your horse more comfortable during and after travelling.

Horses also need at least a couple of hours after competition to properly drain their airways. During this time, they should be encouraged to lower their head sufficiently to assist with draining the airways. We suggest that a small dampened meal fed at ground level or even some grazing if a green pick is available. It is highly recommended to avoid tying your horse with his head





at chest height with a short lead. This may that prevents him from lowering his head to drain airway fluid. This is particularly essential for horses which have competed in dusty conditions such as race horses, polocrosse, campdrafting and any other horse competing on a dusty arena, as they will need at least 15 minutes to drain their lungs and clear any dust that they may have inhaled. Failure to clear this dust from the airways can lead to respiratory problems, especially if they are travelled before being given the chance to drain the dust and allergen content from their lungs.

The float or truck used for transport must also be well ventilated with plenty of air flow and cleaned carefully before and during the long trip to reduce the amount of ammonia from urine and faeces and also reduce airborne dust that could potentially be inhaled. Dusty, dry feed should not be offered during travel; dampened hay in a net is much more suitable for reducing dust levels and providing a bit extra fluid to maintain hydration during travel.

A healthy immune system is also paramount to help minimise the development of travel stress. A course of Kohnke's Own® Activ- 8^{TM} , given 7-10 days prior to travel will help to nutritionally support immune function and help maintain an active immune system when your horse is stressed and performing soon after travelling. The immune-active nutrients in Activ- 8^{TM} can also help reduce the risk of infection and transfer of coughs and colds from other horses which they may come into contact at an event or show, or when travelling with a horse harbouring a stable virus infection.

Closely monitor your horse after travel for any signs of respiratory illness, such as elevated temperature, cough, loss of appetite

or any signs of colic. If any of these symptoms present, please seek veterinary advice immediately, as travelling sickness can be fatal.

Avoiding Heat Stress during Competition

Although horses are able to remove excess body heat in three different ways, including through sweating, air flow over the skin surface and exhaling hot air from the lungs, they can quickly overheat to dangerous levels, particularly when they are competing under hot, humid and especially dusty conditions.

Always ensure a proper cool down after competition. Walking helps the body to remove heat by encouraging the blood flow which allows heat to be moved closer to the skin surface, the air flow around the horse during movement then helps to cool the horse. Hosing the horse's body along the top-line, barrel and hindquarters after the cool down exercises also helps to remove heat from the skin surface. However, always continually scrape the excess cooling water from the horse's skin, particularly underneath the belly, as this is the main place heat is released and water that collects here will trap heat. Hosing a hot horse under the belly for 20-30 minutes will help to remove accumulated heat from the gut 'heat sink' and make your horse more comfortable.

Always offer cool water to drink. An effective and easy way to rehydrate your horse after work is to offer a rehydrating drink containing 5 litres of luke-warm water, 50g (2 ½ tablespoons) of fine plain salt and 50g of glucose (called dextrose in many feed or produce stores). This simple equine sports drink can be given at home each day after exercise, so that your horse becomes accustomed to looking for and enjoying his post-training or

competition drink. Offering this tasty drink is an excellent and very cost effective way to ensure rehydration after hard training or competition. Drinking away from home is often a problem for horses as they often do not like the taste of different water sources. This simple 'home made' rehydration drink helps to alleviate this problem.

In hot, tropical areas, it is critical that you monitor your horse for his ability to sweat effectively. Sweating is a very important method for the horse to be able to regulate his body temperature. Many horses develop a condition known as 'anhydrosis' which is the inability to sweat when stressed by hot, humid tropical conditions. Horses, like humans, use sweating to remove 50-60% of accumulated heat from their core body. Under very humid conditions, when horses from a cool Southern environment have not had time to adapt to the heat and humidity and do not have the correct electrolyte balance required for their level of work, can progressively lose their ability to sweat. This occurs over a 4-6 week period because environmental heat stress reduces the efficiency and eventually the number of sweat glands in the affected horse. This, in turn, affects how well they can regulate their body temperature. A horse with anhydrosis will show symptoms such as little or no sweating during work, increased shallow breaths and 'panting' or 'the puffs' as they try to remove heat via their lungs. These horses are at a much higher risk of overheating. Kohnke's Own® Troppo-Salts™ is an ideal supplement to help with this condition. Coat Conditioning Tips for All Horses

Achieving a show winning coat is a common talking point and there are many factors that can help to achieve that ribbon winning gloss and shine. Firstly, it is important to ensure that the horse has a well-balanced diet. A diet deficient in some or many micronutrients, such as trace-minerals and vitamins, will negatively affect coat colour intensity, coat condition and general vitality. A balanced diet with sufficient levels of trace-minerals copper, zinc and iron, plus vitamins such as vitamin A and E are essential for a healthy coat. Any deficiencies can affect the general health, colour and appearance of the coat. Diets that are too high in protein can also affect the shine of the coat and chronic dehydration can also cause short, brittle hair.

A ration which consists of pre-mixed feeds, when fed at the full recommended rate, should provide the right balance of nutrients needed. However, many owners and trainers find that their horse becomes hot, silly, fizzy or too fat on the recommended amounts of many prepared feeds. If the horse is on a natural diet of pasture, hay and/or grain, or not fed at the recommended rates of a premixed or 'complete' feed, you should add a comprehensive tracemineral and vitamin supplement. This extra supplement will help top-up the diet with the recommended amounts of daily nutrients, especially those that may be deficient in diets of horses in moderate or higher levels of training or competition. Heavy work can affect nutrient balance and lead to sweat loss and turnover of many important trace-minerals and vitamins. Keeping your horse's coat clean and free from dust and grime with regular grooming and washing will also help boost coat

condition and shine. Regular brushing is necessary to remove old hair, dirt and dust. Brushing with a curry comb, three times a week in a circular motion will remove any old or loose hairs. Finish with a soft brush as this also helps stimulate natural oil glands within the skin and distribute the oil over the coat. Working your horse until he sweats over his body, then lightly curry combing to massage his skin, will release oils from the skin and add a natural gloss to the coat.

Our tip is to avoid shampoos that are detergent-based, as these will strip the natural oils from the coat and frequent use of soap-based shampoos will then give a dull, lifeless appearance. Rugging your horse after their bath will also help to keep the coat clean and free from dust. Achieving the award-winning coat can take several weeks to achieve, so allow plenty of time for preparation so that you see the results you want. If your horse's diet is not correctly balanced with the right levels of essential nutrients, it will take a while for the body to build up the stores of the nutrients that will help create intense coat colour, shine and condition. an a self confessed



Hello my name is Sam Hargrave and I am a self confessed horse-a-holic. I have loved horses since I could say the words, "Dad, I love horses, may I have one" (over and over until I drove him nuts and he bought me one – it took about six years from the age of four).

It has been quite a journey, as I was certainly not born into a horsey family. I was raised by my father and lived with my brother, both motor heads. Dad raced drag boats, and motor cross bikes and my brother raced street sedans at Amaroo Park and Oran Park.

It wasn't until I was 10 years old when Dad said he had bought me a stock horse. As memories go it still is one of most exciting and happiest moments in my life. He was kept in a 500 acre paddock at Cherrybrook, "Jenna Stables". I got riding lessons from George Sanna the famous Show Jump rider. I rode my horse out with

my older teenage friends from Cherrybrook in the Hills district of Sydney, all the way to Hornsby and out through the bush tracks to West Pennant Hills, Baulkham Hills and North Rocks, well before the housing estates and motorways. Dad would float my horse and I to Dural Pony Club and I got into sporting events and can remember winning every event at the Orange Blossom Festival. I won my first and most treasured trophy (It was my only trophy until my forties). I kept riding until I went to boarding school, when my horse was put to sleep from old age. I didn't own a horse again until I met my husband and he took over from my father spoiling me.

I moved to Perth to marry Phil, in 1997, where he had a house at Sorrento Beach. He sold the house and the surf board and we moved to Gidgegannup. He bought me a horse and the surf board turned into a saddle. Our Farrier Keith Murray kept telling us to get a real horse (a Quarter Horse). For my wedding present Phil bought me the most gorgeous chestnut Quarter Horse gelding with four white socks, a cutting horse by Bar Doc Hickory. He had been trained by Morning Sun Ranch. And I started showing in the Swan Valley.

Phil's business took us to Melbourne and of course I brought my treasured Hickory's







Astro with us and we lived in Whittlesea and I joined the Plenty Valley Western club. We only stayed a year, but we had a lot of fun and met a lot of nice people.

We moved to the Sunshine Coast, and purchased a 120 acre cattle fattening property. I bought Phil a beautiful mare called "Custard Tart" and she was the most beautiful palomino. We all lived happily like a fairy tale, riding all over the property hand in hand and life was good until three tragic events hit us like a train wreck.

First the resumption of our property for The Traveston Dam we are not having, then when both of our treasured horses were treated by the local vet did routine dental work. They were sedated, worm pasted and vaccinated on the same day. In short, they never recovered and after three days in intensive care they were both euthanasia. I still don't know what went wrong but, when things go tragically wrong it seems common to say "that's never happened before". Is that because

it's not being documented? If I could have a voice to my horsey friends I would say;" Never ever let a vet do multiple things on the same day". I remember speaking to my dad on the phone, when this was all happening and saying I can handle this because I have you. Shortly after, he called me to say he had a spot on his liver so I raced to Sydney met with my brother and we each held his hand until he died a few weeks later from pancreatic cancer.

Phil and I fought the Queensland Government for 12 months to get a fair price for our farm but, nothing could save my Dad or our horses. I felt broken, but I could hear my father's voice. "Its not what happens to you, its how you deal with it. "Get up, Never Give Up"! I could have given up or I could go harder. I chose to go harder, to be my absolute best, to get out of bed earlier than everyone else even when I didn't feel like it and to seek out someone who would take be from a B show beginner to the best I can be was my project.

Since I have met Andrew and Emma Woinarksi of Image Performance Horses, and started taking their honest advice I have improved every year. My client brief to them from the start was safe, fun and competitive. They have always made it safe and fun and now with time and effort I am in the lineup. I am really excited about 2017 with the Stunning Gregory - PPH Cee A Bar Prophecy (National Champion), the super dooper National Champion, Tally S Fifty Shades of Grey and our Quirran Lea Oreo Cookie who is expecting a Cool Kisser baby in 2017.

People say all the time to me "you smile a lot". I'd have to say that's because I have three Paint Horses to love and an awesome husband

There are some sayings that have kept me going. "Don't wish it were easier, work on being better", "Never, Never, ever give up, You haven't failed unless you give up", and one of Dads favourites, "The harder I work the luckier I get".



Fernleigh Paint Horse Stud came to be in 2008, with the purchase of a small property near Ballina on the NSW Far North Coast. Prior to that, Andrew and Kyla Fay had owned and bred Paint Horses for eight years, having purchased the Big Red mare, Ribbons n Bows (aka 'Belle'), in 1999 from Inca Paint Horse Stud. Through Belle they developed a love of the breed and their goal was to contribute to improving the breed as a whole.





After breeding a few mares to different stallions available in Australia for some wonderful foals, Fernleigh Paints direction in breeding swung to the working bred tobianos. Of particular interest was a stallion called The Big Gun, a World Champion Reiner and proven sire of champions. The Big Gun was only available via imported frozen semen in Australia. The race was then on to breed their mare, Pretty Pistol, to produce a colt to stand at stud. A lot of money was invested over multiple attempts to try and gain a positive pregnancy unfortunately to no avail and with the vets unable to offer any explanation. Pistol returned home empty and sadly two weeks later passed away. It seemed she hadn't been well for some time and the pregnancy was never going to be.

Losing Pistol was a huge loss to the Fernleigh Paints breeding program, and with only a few straws remaining of The Big Gun the chances of producing the colt they wanted were significantly reduced. In 2011 Andrew and Kyla made the decision to import a stallion. They searched throughout Australia and the US, finally settling on a colt foal by the name of Nevada's Smoking Gun ('Motown') – a brown, double homozygous tobiano by Big Gunner, an own son of The Big Gun. Motown was bred by Wendy Malone of Spotted Fawn Paint and Quarter Horse Ranch in Montana USA. Wendy was extremely supportive and helpful throughout the process; a wealth of knowledge offering advice on the type

of stallion to purchase that would be suitable for their program. She knew Motown would be a perfect fit for the future of Fernleigh Paints.

While they waited for Motown to mature enough to make the journey from the US to Australia, Andrew and Kyla began developing their breeding improvement plan. They began importing frozen semen to put to their foundation mares, with the aim to produce the first generation of fillies to breed to Motown. In a bid to further develop the tobiano in Australia the stud diversified, becoming agents for the distribution of frozen semen from some of the best working bred Paints in the world. Initially they secured The Big Gun and Mark This Spot and very soon after that the homozygous tobiano, QTsGold Mastercard, arrived as well. Word spread quickly and other studs began to contact them to act as agents, leading to the addition of Hollywood Reminic, Dun Gotta Gun (QH) and Lil More Conclusive.

Over the next few years Fernleigh Paints acquired further broodmares, the first being Wayouts Dreamin in Dun (Willow), a bay







dun triple homozygous tobiano filly by QT Dunupdouble (imp). The second was Treasured Pepper K (Treasure) a homozygous black, brown tobiano filly by Lookin Treasured (imp) and the last mare was a palomino dual registered PHAA/QH named Docs Poppy King (Poppy) by Peppys Doc Bar. Willow and Treasure were not old enough to breed at this stage, so Poppy was bred to QTsGold Mastercard and foaled the gorgeous smoky cream tobiano filly, FP Cream Soda.

Motown arrived in October 2012 as a 15-month-old colt and was everything Wendy had said he was and more. Easy to get along with, responsive and willing to learn, he settled in very well to his new home. Over the next few months he spent some time being foundation trained by Bianca Gillanders during her Northern Rivers Clinics, with Boot Camp for Broncs. It set him up to succeed and the progression to being started began.

Motown's training continued with Ken Faulkner starting him in August 2013, and then six months later Wayne Williams started him with some basic Reining training. Motown was going so well by this stage that the decision was made to target the Ranch Events at the PHAA Nationals in 2015.

Willow had been bred to The Big Gun using the remaining frozen semen and in 2014 gave birth to her first foal, an amazing, extremely minimally marked, triple homozygous bay dun colt that was named FP Sniper. He was the colt that Andrew and Kyla had always hoped to breed and thought they never would! Being






such a small stud there unfortunately wasn't enough room to keep two stallions and after much deliberation Sniper was sold to Angel Marsh in NZ. Sniper is currently in Reining training with Shaun Saunders and will stand at stud in Australia during 2017.

Early in 2015, a few months before the PHAA Nationals, Motown started training on cattle with Steve Byrne. Steve also prepared Motown in Ranch Riding for his first ever show. Steve was unable to ride in the event himself so he arranged for Daniel Gorman to compete. It proved to be a very successful combination with Motown winning four National Championships and two Reserve National Championships at his first ever show. He was awarded National Champion in Ranch Reining, Ranch Pleasure, Ranch Boxing and Reserve National Champion in Ranch Trail and Ranch Sorting. He then became the overall 2015 Junior Ranch Horse Versatility National Champion.

In November 2015 Treasure foaled Motown's first foal – a gorgeous filly that is a complete replica of both her parents, named FP Nevada's Lil Treasure (Paris). Four days later Willow foaled a fabulous triple homozygous bay colt, this time by Mark This Spot (frozen semen). FP Spot On (Spot) is a three-quarter brother to Sniper.

At the end of 2015 the opportunity to purchase another QT mare presented itself in 'Prim', a bay dun silver tobiano filly by QT Dunupdouble (imp), who will be bred to Motown in 2017. The silver gene is rare in Paint Horses and it is believed she is



the only homozygous tobiano carrying both dun and silver in the country at this time.

After such a wonderful 2015 PHAA Nationals Show, Andrew and Kyla made the decision to return in 2016 – this time Motown went to Clay Evans who rode him in all the events to again be hugely successful, winning National Champion in the Ranch Reining, Ranch Riding, Ranch Boxing, and third in the Ranch Trail. Again he was named overall 2015 Junior Ranch Horse Versatility National Champion.

After only two shows Motown has been awarded eight National Championships and two Reserve National Championships in Ranch Events. This is quite an achievement for a five-year-old stallion.

During 2016 Motown's semen was collected and frozen by Oliver Liyou in Grafton. The vets were very excited with the quality (and quantity!) of the semen, which has a post thaw motility of 75%.

Late in 2016 Willow foaled an amazing bay dun tobiano filly that sold within a minute of appearing on the stud's Facebook page. FP Nevada's Aztec Rose (Reya) has generated so much interest there is a waiting list for Willow's 2017 foal, a guaranteed bay or bay dun homozygous tobiano foal. Willow's full sister, Wayouts Dream QT (Tia) is also due to foal a Motown baby in November 2017 for a guaranteed double homozygous black or bay tobiano. There is a waiting list for this foal as well.

Fernleigh Paints have four exceptional broodmares in the paddocks and from 2018 onwards there will be foals by Motown due and available for purchase every year. Most foals will be guaranteed homozygous tobiano, black or bay based and all foals are five panel negative through parentage. Frozen semen is also available for Motown in 2017, as well as Hollywood Reminic and Dun Gotta Gun. The frozen semen has proven to be very popular with breeders and as a result the other stallions have sold out over the past few years. Fernleigh Paints are looking forward to adding more stallions to the frozen stable in 2017.


There are two very special people who have contributed to the success of Fernleigh Paints, without whom none of this would be possible.

Tire Ants and Horses

A Biosecurity Queensland spokesperson said:

Fire ants are one of the world's most invasive species. If they establish permanently in Queensland they will ruin our way of life, and have serious health and environmental impacts. Everyday activities, such as barbecues, picnics and sporting events may no longer be possible in high infestation areas.



Just how dangerous is a Fire Ant attack on a horse?

Like all livestock, horses are susceptible to attacks by Fire Ants. While the threat to healthy, mobile, adult animals is fairly minimal, there is a significant risk to horses when lying down, penned horses and newborns.

When disturbed, Fire Ants will swarm and attach to areas of open skin and mucous membranes around the eyes and muzzle, delivering hundreds of simultaneous stings, which are immediately painful.

Injuries include skin irritation, blindness, lameness, secondary infections, abortions, and possible death.

Fire Ants can establish nests close to food and water supplies, and if the infestation is dense enough, can impede horse access and potentially lead to malnutrition and dehydration.

Fortunately, there have been no reports to date of horses suffering significant adverse effects from Fire Ant stings in Australia.

What are the symptoms on a horse when bitten by Fire Ants?

Clinical signs of Fire Ant stings include intense pain, pruritis (itching), and erythema (redness of the skin produced by conges-

tion of the capillaries). Sometimes only secondary lesions, such as erythema and epidermal collarettes (a circular lesion with a circular rim of scale and/or a peeling edge) may be noticed, and affected skin may feel thickened and corrugated.

What would the wound area look like?

Immediately after the sting there would be redness to the affected area and pustules would usually develop within 12 to 24 hours

What is the treatment for a horse after being bitten?

Treatment for a horse that has been stung by Fire Ants should be carried out only by a veterinarian. If you see symptoms on your horse, keep them calm and prevent them from scratching as much as possible until your vet arrives.

Affected animals should be observed for any possible secondary complications such as laminitis (founder) respiratory difficulty, abortion, etc.

Materials most likely to spread Fire Ants

Materials that can spread Fire Ants are known as Fire Ant carriers. There are restrictions on the movement of these materials within fire ant biosecurity zones. Fire Ant carriers include:

- soil (e.g. fill, clay, scrapings, and any material removed from the ground at a site where earthworks are being carried out)
- mulch
- animal manures
- baled hay or straw
- potted plants
- turf
- mining or quarry products
- composted materials.

What does a landowner look for when looking for Fire Ants and whom do they contact if they are

worried about their property being contaminated?

Fire Ants are small, only 2-6 millimetres long, and are coppery-brown with a dark abdomen.

Their nests look like a mound of loose dirt and have no visible entry holes. They vary in size and may be found in open ground, under logs, rocks and gardening materials.

The top five spots to look for Fire Ants on residential properties include lawns, footpaths, garden beds, outside taps and sprinklers and utility pits.

On rural properties they are more likely to be found near dams or irrigation lines, on the edges of cultivated land, around or in hay bales, fence lines and piles of organic matter.

It is recommended that properties be checked monthly for the presence of Fire Ants. This can be done in conjunction with your existing weed seed and herd monitoring.

Fire Ants are a category I restricted pest and you are required to notify Biosecurity Queensland, or in your state, of any suspect ants within 24 hours of finding them.

Craig SHutt A colourful adventure

Four awesome Paint Horses, travelling over 100km of steep Victorian high country, in three days.

On the 4th of February Rowena Wilcox, Anna Tasker, Mel and Maddie Lane floated Wakoda Xtreme Affect, Loots Profit, My Te Intimidating and Celebration to Telephone Box Junction, where they would start their three day journey exploring a small, but extraordinary part of the Victorian High Country.

We all rode off out of Telephone Box Junction with thoughts of how our dreams were becoming reality at that moment. A life long dream for all of us to ride through the high country, and in particular see the famous Craig's Hut first hand.

On the way to our dream destination we saw landscapes of never ending mountains, some still scarred from bush fires. As we climbed the narrow tracks through vast amounts of bush, we would be stopped every now and then by Cameron, our trusty leader, when he would say, "You know that scene in the movie where Bess runs off with the brumbies?" And we would all excitedly agree and think we were in a movie scene location only to be answered with, "Well that didn't happen here".

We did however visit lots of places where the action once was, one of my personal favourites was cantering up to the top of Sterling Summit and looking around and just seeing mountains. They looked as though they went on forever - it was an absolute moment of awe.

Shortly after Sterling Summit we found a dam for the horses to cool down in, just before reaching Craig's Hut. As we rode into the open paddock in front of the Hut, I remember feeling so much relief and excitement about our accomplishment. A victory gallop was done past the Hut and then our precious Paints were given a well

deserved break, while we explored and admired the breathtaking view on offer. Reluctantly we had to ride on to reach our next stop, which would be camp for the night at Pikes Flat along the Howqua River.

The next day we all packed up our soaked swags from the nights rain, put on our wet boots and set off toward Ritchie's Hut in the drizzle. We rode along a narrow track that looked down onto the river. We were all a bit nervous about a horse's foot going too close to the edge toward the drop. Once we got past the slightly scary bit we came into an open area where Ritchie's Hut was looking onto water, and it even had a round yard to tie horses for a rest. Sitting in the Hut we could see nothing out the windows, but freshly watered bush. It was very peaceful.

From there we crossed the first of the 26 water crossings ahead of us in our adventure for the day. The horses eagerly splashed through the water and up the riverbanks. They jumped down ledges into water, slid down wet embankments and jumped many logs. They did that over and over all the way to our camp for the night, Frys Hut, near the old Howqua Hills township. The hut was fairly large and had two rooms and our makeshift tack room. We were all happy to be sleeping under a roof so that our already wet swags didn't get any worse during the night.

As we rode out for our final day, we began the morning visiting Professor's Hut, which was made of kerosene tins (their building material of choice), that had been floated down the river.

We then headed to Tabletop Mountain following an old track that used to be the one horse and carts used to get to Merrijig from the Howqua Hills township. The rain had made the red clay super slippery and proved to be quite challenging. The track isn't used often so was overgrown leading us to ride a large portion of the track leaning down, so we didn't get coat hangered by the branches.

I spent the last hour or two of the ride, reflecting on how far we had come and how many challenges our horses were faced with, and how they handled everything so brilliantly. As we came into Merrijig we were all so relieved and proud about completing our goal.

At the completion of the ride Cameron highlighted the tracks we rode on a map, and to see just how far we rode was unbelievable. We all exceeded our own expectations on what our horses and we were capable of.
