BANG for your BUCK Horse Jear





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Controlling worms in foals and young horses is important.

The immature immune systems of foals and young horses make them far more susceptible to worms than older animals. Some worm species are very common in young horses but rarely seen in older horses as their immune system develops with age. Young animals are also more susceptible to damage caused by worms due to their smaller size. Immature lungs and digestive systems are easily damaged by migrating worms, and a worm burden that may not cause a problem in an adult horse can easily block a foal's gut.

Ascarids. The worm most dangerous to young horses.

The large roundworm or ascarid primarily affects horses less than two years of age. Ascarids are the most significant parasite in young horses because they are such large worms and can quickly develop into life threatening numbers. Ascarids have the potential to cause liver damage, which is repairable, and lung damage, which is permanent.


The ascarid life cycle.

Each female ascarid can lay 100,000 to 200,000 eggs each day. The eggs pass out with the horse's faeces. Infective larvae develop within coated eggs, which are not affected by adverse weather conditions and can remain viable for up to 10 years. When the egg is ingested its coating is digested in the horse's stomach.

As the eggs reach the small intestine they hatch and the larvae immediately penetrate the lining of the intestinal tract, beginning a 30 day migration. It is important to remember that faecal egg tests do not detect migration of parasite larvae within the horse.

Liver damage by ascarid larvae.

The larvae travel by the hepatic vein to the liver, where they eat their way around the liver for seven to ten days. Fortunately, the liver is a very resilient organ and can regenerate itself. Permanent damage to the liver from ascarid larval migration is seldom seen.



The ascarid larvae migration continues.

The larvae then travel to the lungs and continue their migration for I4 to 2I days, again eating their way around lung tissue. Unlike the liver, damage done to the lungs is permanent as lungs heal by scarring and so do not regenerate. After the ascarids mature and are ready to complete migration they burrow from the blood side of the lung into the air side.

Lung damage from ascarid larvae migration.

A microscopic look at normal lung tissue shows empty air spaces, the alveoli, where oxygen is exchanged for CO2. When migrating

ascarid larvae are present, the immune system violently reacts to the foreign protein and destroys the alveoli. Such damage predisposes foals to pneumonia and may result in pulmonary haemorrhaging in a horse that intended to become an athlete. The worms then crawl from the alveoli into the bronchioles, to the bronchi and then into the trachea. They cause enough irritation to elicit a cough so that they are coughed to the back of the throat and are re-swallowed as mature larvae. As adults they swim upstream in the small intestine. robbing the horse of nutrition. Once the larvae reach the small intestine for the second time, their presence there is of relatively little consequence to the horse unless they are allowed to develop into large numbers that can cause life threatening blockages of the intestines, especially in foals.

Protect your young horse's lungs.

When a horse is just a few months old it has all the lung tissue it is ever going to have. Because lung tissue heals by scarring, damage to these sensitive structures is permanent with less functional lung available for the horse to utilise. Horses whose lungs have been damaged by ascarid larval migration may have to breathe harder and faster to meet their oxygen demand as they develop and are asked to perform.

Ascarid larval migration can also lead to other diseases. It reduces overall thriftiness in foals and can be related to pneumonia in foals. Ascarid larvae may have an immunosuppressive effect in the lung, reducing the ability of the horse's immune system to respond to foreign invaders like bacteria and viruses.

Understanding chemical resistance and ascarids.

Proper product selection is paramount in areas where resistance is already present and equally important in preventing future development of resistance. Macrocyclic lactones or mectins on their own are no longer recommended for treatment of young horses. It is essential that all horses less than two years of age include a THP (pyrantel) in their worming program because mectins and BZs used on their own are not reliable enough against ascarids. Combination anthelmintics can slow the development of resistance and are more useful in the face of preexisting resistant populations (Wilkes et al, 2017). Equimax® Elevation and Strategy-T® are unique combination products highly suitable for the current resistance status of roundworms in Australian foals.

The best way to treat and control worms in young horses.

In summary, to protect young horses from potential resistance issues, it is recommended that a combination product registered to treat mectin resistant ascarids, such as Equimax® Elevation or Strategy-T®, be used. Young horses should be wormed regularly with Strategy-T in spring and summer and Equimax Elevation in autumn and winter from eight-twelve weeks of age until they are two years old. It is also recommended to begin a FEC monitoring program for yearlings to help guide treatment frequency. Refer to our targeted strategic worming guide for your foal program below.

ITS OUR Journal

A new Equine Breeding Centre has recently opened its doors in South East Queensland. EquiNetics, operated by Jeffrey and Lee Ann Hall of Hallmark Farm has just completed its first full breeding season since relocating from Dubbo. An overwhelming response and a very high success rate has been achieved.

Jeffrey and Lee Ann are long term "western breed" competitors, breeders and judges, as well as being qualified Artificial Insemination Technicians. Horses are their lives and their passion.

By chance, Jeffrey and Lee Ann began building the breeding centre business after meeting Roberto Novario – and Italian Equine Reproduction Specialist Veterinarian. Roberto and his partner

were on vacation in 2009 and were looking for live in work whilst holidaying in Australia and came across Hallmark Farm. It just happened to be the beginning of the Australian breeding season.

Previously, artificial breeding work was left to their veterinarian. But now with a live in vet, things were about to change. Roberto was the inspiration for Jeffrey and Lee Ann to start their education

and training in artificial breeding techniques, as well as improving their knowledge and skills in general equine reproduction knowledge. Roberto is a wonderful educator, very thorough and patient, spending several months hands on training at Hallmark Farm. Roberto returned for a subsequent breeding season and has remained a friend and an important reference point.

Always wanting to improve and upskill, the next step was to look for formal education. There is very little education available in Australia in the specialised field of equine reproduction. Goulburn Valley Equine Hospital offer the Advanced Equine Reproduction Course and Artificial Insemination Course, which were promptly undertaken by Jeffrey and Lee Ann. Both courses being a good starting point for the home breeder, but specialised training and education were needed to continue to build the business.

Regular trips to the USA to train and upskill have been undertaken in the last eight years, including training with Equine Reproduction LLC, The Breeders Assistant LLC, Jos Motterhead, Kathy St Martin and Dr David Riddle.

Hallmark Farm moved from Dubbo to Kilkivan, near Gympie Qld in mid 2016, purchasing a 125 acre property that was not yet set up for breeding. During the following year major improvements were made including construction of stallion yards, mare yards, stables, holding yards, breeding crush area, collection area and of course a laboratory, with the safety of both horse and handler being kept in mind.

Being located on a highway, passing trade as well as word of mouth saw EquiNetics fully booked for the 2017 season.

"We are very grateful of the response we have received and that so many people have entrusted their beautiful mares and stallions with us, we certainly didn't expect to be this busy first season and are gearing up for the 2018 season already."

Many breeds can be seen residing in the yards during the breeding season – some of the breeds that were worked with include Paint, Quarter Horse, Appaloosa, Stock Horse, Warmblood, Andalusian, Irish Sport Horses – quite a variety.

EquiNetics offer AI facilities for fresh, chilled or frozen semen. For the mare owner the process is simple, send your mare to EquiNetics, chose your stallion and the EquiNetics team will do the rest, including contacting the stallion owner, ordering the semen and breeding your mare.


For the stallion owner – some stallions will reside at EquiNetics throughout the breeding season, others will be "walk-ins", visiting only when a collection is required. Again EquiNetics can do the organisation for you, dealing direct with the mare owners veterinarian through to collecting your stallion and shipping the semen.

EquiNetics was approved by the University of Queensland for work experience training of their veterinary students, a placement being filled in the 2017 season and already booked for 2018 season. This allows young students to have hands on experience as well as being able to share their ideas and education with the EquiNetics team.

"We take pride in our work and in caring for your horse. Communication with the owner is very important to us, we know









how special a horse can be to its owner and how much some owners miss seeing their horses. When we are scanning mares for pregnancies I try to remember to take a photo of each little positive scan (embryo) and send to the mare owner, it's the starting point for the next chapter in the mares life and means so much to some owners."

"Our success rate has been very high, we would like to send every mare home in foal, but sadly, nature doesn't always allow this to happen. I believe our success is all to do with hard work and dedication. The horses are literally at our back door and if we need to scan a mare at 2am we can and we will. Unlike veterinarians, we are not going to be called out on other work, we are here, on site, to care for your horse and get the job done."

Still under construction, EquiNetics will have further improvements before the 2018 breeding season, including doubling the size of

the current barn, further steel fencing and building an additional crush area.

When breeding season comes to an end, EquiNetics winds down and the training facility kicks in to full swing with horses in preparation for Paint, Appaloosa and Quarter Horse National Shows. Drive past in breeding season and you will see the yards full of mares, drive past out of breeding season and you will see the arena in use and horses being exercised on the 10 horse Magnum walker, work never stops at Hallmark Farm.

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Pasture management for worm control

It is coming into spring again and time to consider implementing some changes to your worming regime. As the temperatures increase, the worm eggs that have remained dormant on the pasture over winter will hatch into infective larvae, exposing your horse to rapidly increasing parasite burdens. Rather than simply relying on drenching your animal, there are several other ways you can reduce the numbers of infective larvae, thus reducing the levels of infectivity your horse is exposed to.

It is important to remember that it is not the worm eggs on the pasture that are the concern, but rather the infective larvae that hatch from these eggs. While the temperatures are very cold (under 6°C), the eggs lie inactive in the faeces or on the pasture and present no danger to the horse if eaten. However, increasing temperature will stimulate these harmless eggs to hatch into the next stage of the worm life cycle – the infective larvae. This can take 12-14 days at temperatures of 10°C. Once temperatures are 25-33°C, it takes only 3-4 days for eggs to hatch into infective larvae.

When swallowed by the grazing horse, these larvae will go on to complete their life cycle and develop into adult, disease-causing worms. This is what we need to avoid! Below are some strategies to help reduce the amount of infective larvae on the pasture.

Dung Removal

By far the most effective way of reducing larval numbers on your paddocks is via removal of the dung. If you remove the manure (and the worm eggs each pile contains) then there will be far less eggs left on the pasture to hatch into the infective larvae. As temperatures increase so does the hatching and so dung removal should be performed every three days. Obviously this may not be practical for large farms, so other methods will need to be used to minimise exposure.

Resting Paddocks

On bigger farms, mares are often moved from paddocks to the working area to be under lights or to foal down. This means that certain paddocks will be partially rested when the mares are moved, and therefore the shedding of eggs onto these pastures (and the number of infective larvae that could develop) has been reduced

Cross-Grazing

It would be a wise idea to take some manure samples from these mare paddocks to carry out Faecal Egg Counts. This will help to gauge which are the "dirtier" paddocks with the higher egg counts. As the old saying goes: "Drench the paddock, not the animal." If the egg counts from a particular paddock are high, it would be better to allow older, less susceptible animals to graze these pastures compared with younger stock, or even rest the paddock completely. If cattle (steers) are available, then they should be moved into the contaminated paddock to help "mop up" the worm eggs and larvae.

Yearlings could also be moved onto these paddocks if the contamination isn't too high to grow these young animals out. Make sure if you are putting your yearlings onto these pastures that they have been drenched with an effective treatment at least three days prior to moving them.

Harrowing

As the temperature and moisture levels should be ideal for eggs to hatch into infective larvae, it could be a good idea to harrow the paddock before putting cattle or other animals onto these pastures. Harrowing, followed by one to two months of hard grazing will effectively reduce the infectivity of a paddock by up to half. Imagine your animals being exposed to one million infective larvae in a paddock versus the exposure to only 100,000!

Using Older Animals to "Clean" Paddocks

Generally older animals are less susceptible to worm pressure than younger animals as their level of natural immunity is higher. If cattle are not available to cross graze, you can use older animals to do the same. This is known as a "leader-follower system". Using this system, younger animals (that are more susceptible to worms and will shed more eggs) are grazed first in a paddock, and then the older animals are used to graze afterwards to "mop up" all the eggs and infective larvae. This also allows the younger, growing animals to graze the new spring protein-rich pasture. If cattle are available it will allow you to turn the steers off into the fat market more readily.



Thinking Ahead

It might also be time to think about what paddock(s) you will want this year's foals to graze in over the autumn/winter of next year when they are weaned. At this time, a weanling will be under the greatest worm pressure as its immune system is still trying to develop. Also, the number of infective worm larvae on the pasture the foals are exposed to during this period is at its greatest.

Preparing the paddock can be done by grazing it with cattle from November through to the end of January the following year. At the end of January, the paddock should be rested to let the pasture recover and then make use of the first autumn rain and growth in March. In March, the weanlings can be put back onto this paddock.

If cattle aren't available, the same effect can be achieved by drenching older, less susceptible horses and putting them in the paddock in November at double the normal stocking density. Do this for no more than 30 days. The paddock is then rested until January when you would repeat this process: drench the same horses at the start of the month, and then put double the normal stocking density on the paddock during January for no more than 30 days. From the start of February, rest the paddock again until the first autumn growth in late March early April. It is then ready for the weanlings. After these two short hard grazing periods, the number of infective larvae on this paddock will be greatly reduced, therefore minimising the exposure to these very susceptible young animals.

By implementing some of these simple pasture management strategies, you can effectively decrease the numbers of infective worm larvae in your paddock, which in turn will reduce your horse's parasite burden. This is turn should mean you can extend the interval between worming treatments and therefore minimise the number of drenches administered to your horse.

FACTS VS MYTHS ABOUT WORMING

Dispelling the myths	Clarifying the facts
"Change your wormer every time you worm".	This used to be common advice, but is now known not to be good practice.
	You should rotate your wormers but not every time you worm. The continual use of one wormer year after year exposes worms to the active ingredient too frequently and will lead to resistance. Rotating treatments by alternating from one compound to another should be done on a seasonal basis to target specific worms.
"You are rotating if you change box colour or manufacturer of wormer you are using".	This is the biggest mistake people make. Instead, check the list of active ingredients on the box and base your decision on this.
	You must rotate from a mectin to an azole or vice-versa. The majority of horse wormers are either avermectin (mectin)-based or benzimidazole (azole)-based. If you're currently using a-mectin your option is to rotate to an-azole, regardless of any other active ingredients it may contain.
"You don't think worms affect your horse so you don't need to de-worm".	Worms can cause diseases such as colic and anaemia. Vets see the diseases due to worms every day. If wormers are not used at all, or used incorrectly, we may be faced with an increase in worm related disease in the future.
	All horses need to be part of a worming program; the importance of worming correctly has been misunderstood by many horse owners. It is vitally important all horses are incorporated into an effective worming program for the health of the horse, now and into the future.
"Any wormer can be used as part of a rotational plan".	Nothing could be further from correct. Always base your selection on changing from one active ingredient class to the other on a seasonal basis, to target specific worms.
	Reading the label of the wormer will enable you to choose the correct active ingredient for the rotational season your horse needs to be wormed for. Take the time to do this, as using the right wormer at the right time will optimise your horse's health.
"All azole wormers are equally effective so you might as well choose the cheapest".	This is proving to be untrue. Some azole wormers have wide-spread resistance, so there's a fair chance your horse may be already resistant to straight/single active azole based wormers.

Someone once told me that the "right" horse would always find you. People look at me oddly when I say this, but it seems to be the story of every western breed horse I have owned.



My early experiences with horses were about as distant from western breeds as they come – my mother bred and showed Andalusians, competed Dressage and always had ponies for her kids to ride. In 2008 this would all change – Nancy Westbrook hassled Mum for months and months that she had the perfect horse for her – a Paint Horse hack by the name of "Navaho Twilight Time", known to most as "Will". Eventually we gave in and drove to Dunedoo to see Will, where I as a tiny nine year old (with no experience riding big horses) would ride him around safely – the rest is history! Will would go on to win National and State Champions, High Point Awards and everything in between. Most importantly, Will cemented a love for riding Quarter Horses and Paints in English disciplines.

Our journey with western breeds continued with the purchase of "Slide On By", another Paint Horse that was meant to simply be a Pony Club horse for me to have some fun on. My mother reminds me to this day that the only reason she bought Slide was that when I rode him for the first time and jumped him (not my forte at the time), I went over the jump in no way connected to the saddle. Slide stopped and waited for me to get back in the saddle properly before going on his way. Slide was the greatest teacher for his riders. He was difficult and quite an anxious horse, but he would never put me in harm's way unless I really asked for it. Unfortunately for me, I did ask for it quite early on in our partnership when I dug my spurs in and pulled on the reins at the same time. I still have scars from where I landed in the Farmers Friend bush!

We made the decision to try Slide as a show horse following an accident off another horse in 2012 that saw me unable to ride anything that touched my right shoulder — anyone who knew Slide knew that he would never pull on this rein. Miracles happened and Slide would go on to win many National Titles — including the Open Hack with me in the saddle as a 13 year old. Many years later, Slide is still what I call the epitome of a versatile horse (just don't ask him to do western!).

At the end of 2014 Mum and I made the jump to Quarter Horses with the purchase of Hollie Shiels' "HL That's Gold" (Jack). Everyone who knows Jack, knows he is Mr Personality – he LOVES to show off and demands everybody's attention at every opportunity he gets. Luckily for me I thought this was a great challenge, so in true form I stole Mum's horse again!

Jack was the definition of the "highs and lows" of horses – his many successes were never with-out input from his very expression hind end! Much like Slide, Jack would also be one of the greatest teachers and friends of my career. Jack not only made me realise how much I love taking a chance and challenging myself, but also taught me how to laugh and learn even during some of the most disappointing rides of my life. Clearly, Jack is the one responsible for teaching me how to embrace a horse's spark so the horse can show you how they perform best. Jack's spark would go on to shine in everything from Hacking to Dressage to Working Equitation to Show Jumping, before his eventual retirement in 2017.

Our decade long involvement in the Non-Traditional Events was not without constant search for the "one" — a purpose bred, big moving performance Quarter Horse. After retiring Jack in 2017, I'll admit I questioned whether it was worth continuing this search, or whether it was time to move on to something new. As I hadn't made up my mind on what I wanted to do, I temporarily turned my attention to the riding ponies I had bred over the last few years. In this time, I started working with Kristen Closson, who welcomed me into a world where Classical and Competitive Dressage meet — who knew this would be intriguing enough to make the hacky turn to Dressage! While I loved working with ponies, they were obviously not a longterm project for me, so I set out to find a suitable Dressage mount (likely Warmblood) to





continue my journey with. At the same time, Mum requested I found her a sensible Quarter Horse or Paint Horse that she could show, do Dressage and Working Equitation with.

Not surprisingly, these two searches crossed paths when Paul Egan introduced me to his magnificent colt "Hustler SP". Having been the product of careful research aimed at breeding a Quarter Horse capable of competing FEI Dressage, Hustler was clearly the Quarter Horse I had searched high and low for 10 years. I would love to say a partnership started immediately. Unfortunately for Hustler and I, I had become quite adamant that I wanted to remember Quarter Horses as Jack and that was that. Luckily for us Paul did a 'Nancy Westbrook' and kept popping up in my messages telling me that he knew I was where Hustler needed to be, and in my hands would be where he would be so successful. By December, I had given in and done what I did best — I took a chance and booked the truck to bring Hustler home to me.

Enter a gigantic three-year-old colt into my life. It was love at first sight – he was the one and there was no question about that! From the first ride Hustler did his absolute best to give 110% of what I had asked him. Having caught the Quarter Horse bug again (as if I'd ever lose it), Hustler was entered for AQHA and PHAA Nationals very early on. Paul's response to this was that Hustler was going to be a National Champion at three.

My instructor's response (before meeting Hustler) was I was crazy, had lost the plot and probably should rethink what horses should be able to do after less than I2 months under saddle! Never the less, the road to Nationals had begun, and a very carefully thought out training competition schedule was made. His first competition was an absolute success – 3rd out of a massive 28 horses at an EA Dressage competition. This would be a challenge for purpose bred Warmbloods, let alone my Quarter Horse. The only problem was Hustler's canter was so big that

nice 20m circles were out of the question and getting around corners in the arena was near impossible.

Fast forward two short months of continuous boot camp and Nationals were here. It was clear that Hustler was made to dominate the dressage arena, but he was still only three and coping in such a big environment was quite a large challenge itself. To cut the story short, Paul was right. Hustler did the impossible - Four National Champions under saddle. This included whopping 77%s in his dressage, winning by margins of 12% and not faltering under the pressure at any point. Hustler would go on to win High Point Non-Traditional English Horse for Q18 Nationals. After being home for less than a week we returned to Tamworth for PHAA Nationals, where he would continue his domination of Dressage and take home another six National Titles, including Grand Champion Led Hack. These wins would be enough to be named High Point English Horse at PHAA Nationals. There was no questioning that this was the horse I had dreamed of from the first time I was put on a horse at a tender six months old.

We are very excited for what the future holds for Hustler SP. Next season should be full of success as we have also purchased Hustler's full sister, Prima Donna SP (Sarina). Both horses have clearly been bred with the intention of top Dressage and show horses and we cannot believe we are the ones that get to work with them. I really believe that Tribulations are the way of the future for Dressage focused Paint/Quarter Horses – simply negotiate with them and encourage them to show their unique spark and the world is at your feet. The possibilities are endless and they are already showing me they will do anything and everything I ask of them (maybe even with a western saddle on – we'll see). There is now no question that my future is full of Paint/Quarter Horses! I look forward to many more years involved in such an encouraging Associations.





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



Addressing the cause of Inflammation and Oedema

We already know that increased permeability in the cell wall and poor elimination of the lymphatic system result in oedema. We also know that toxins, immune reactions, bacterial infections, vitamin c deficiency, trauma, liver and kidney failure are often a cause of this increased permeability. (Biognosis article last issue)

What we may not be aware of is that if the above causes have been ruled out, we need to look at normal metabolic process and a sluggish elimination (include skin and lung as well as bowel, liver and kidney) system as a possible cause. The slower the elimination system, the more likely the system is burdened with parasites (and their waste), myco-toxins as well as a myco-micro-biome that contains parasitic microorganisms that proliferate in the gastrointestinal tract.

The extra burden this creates on the systems of elimination is huge impacting the general wellness of any organism. The result can be allergy, lumpy skin issues and itching, laminitis, lowered immunity and a compromised metabolism predisposing the organism to chronic disease as well as damage to the gut itself by way of inflammation and ulceration. This can cause pain, which results in tucking up, behavioural issues, anxiety and even compensation injury.

Detoxification is always the first step on the road to recovery.

The idea of Detoxification is a very confusing subject – so I have broken this down into several categories familiar to most people.

Fasting (used therapeutically in the cases of human and dogs it is not advised for horses or cats)

Best applied in situations of digestive upsets, liver issues, pancreatic problems, diarrhoea and vomiting.

Keeping up nourishing fluids are essential, and herbal teas like Chamomile, Rosehips, Ginger and Peppermint are ideal. Prolonged fasting needs to be supervised appropriately and is not recommended in many situations.

Knowing when to apply this method of detoxification is critical to the success. Periodic fasting in humans when healthy has

numerous benefits, as studies are now showing. Dogs also benefit from fasting as their digestive systems have evolved coping for periods of time without food.

Horses cannot be without roughage for any longer than 12 hours otherwise chemical changes can occur not only within the gut and microbiome, but also can impact blood sugar levels negatively.

Clean Foods – in this day and age of fast foods, a simple whole food eating plan is now considered detoxing. By simple I mean keeping to whole foods and eliminating foods known to cause digestive issues. Foods like Wheat, Sugar, Coffee and Alcohol. I promote this kind of diet as a standard way to eat, incorporating the idea of 80-90% is whole food, and 20-10% can be "cheats" so long as you're generally healthy. You can't cheat if you're trying to achieve a healthy outcome in a specific period of time, or if you're chronically ill.

For horses a clean diet is actually proving to be much harder to achieve - this is due to lack of clean natural grasses and an oversupply of hard feeds that are usually grain or lupin based. High fibre/low GI is best, preferably free of chemical herbicides.

Using herbs is ideal and is preferable for the mono-gastric herbivore that has evolved grazing on grasses and herbs.

Colon Cleansing (people and dogs) - Colon Cleansing is very useful for people (and dogs) who are prone to constipation and inflammation such as Irritable Bowel. Toning up the colon with a cathartic cleansing program can have wonderful benefits. Clearing out stagnant waste improves the overall bowel ecology, settles excessive mucus and helps to promote cleaner nutritional uptake by helping to repair the "leaky gut" syndrome.

It's useful to consider the whole Gastro Intestinal tract as you would your external skin. Even though the system is well moistened, the skin and mucosal lining suffer from irritation, blisters, parasitic damage and atrophy. Herbs like Wormwood help to make the lining very unattractive to parasites, and the lovely slippery elm powder will add a pre biotic benefit as well as protect an irritated GIT from ulceration. Raw Apple cider Vinegar which has been used a base for all our herbal extracts of garlic, wormwood, chinses rhubarb and tansy are ideal to create the desired environment for a healthy Myco-Microbiota.

Soothing herbs like slippery elm and Chamomile are critical if doing a cleansing with Senna and Cascara otherwise these herbs can also irritate an already sensitive lining adding to the problem.

In horses soothing the gut is essential, as studies are now recognising that upward of 80% of our domesticated horses have gastric ulceration.

The prebiotic and soothing benefits of slippery elm powder make this the most critical treatment for the horse's microbiota and repairing leaky gut, responsible for all kinds of chronic disease processes.

Giving Chamomile supports the parasympathetic nervous system - it's important to shift from the sympathetic nervous system (high awareness flight /fight) to a resting parasympathetic responsive suitable for healthy peristalsis.

Organ Support - when an herbalist discusses ideas of stimulating elimination, it's essential that the organs that are responsible for this task are well supported. The kidney and liver are the most obvious to support, and both respond well to the right herbs.

Dandelion, Rosehips and St Marys Thistle are considered the easiest and cheapest to source and use as teas.

How well we breathe (and our horses) to make use of the oxygen in our blood and the elimination of carbon dioxide is also important, so lung health is critical. The process of energy release and the subsequent metabolic waste are areas often overlooked when considering elimination. Through iridology and appropriate questioning you can see find weakness and therefore provide the most relevant support . Elecampane, Nettle, Rue and Hawthorn may be prescribed for lung strength and heart health with the aim of improving overall metabolic waste elimination by improving oxygenation in the blood stream.

Blood Cleansing – This is where we start to become a little medieval. The term Blood Cleanser is certainly one of those terms that seems like a medieval myth, and gives rise to the idea of the "quackery" with herbal medicine.

Blood Cleansing simply means that certain herbs (classed as alterative) nourish the metabolic process to increase elimination and stimulate the immune functions of cleaning up viral debris, bacterial debris and of our own cells that are dying off all the time. Specific lymphatic herbs like Violet leaves and Fenugreek are also used.

It's not known really how these herbs work, but it can be assumed that the nutrition the herbs provide are essential for these functions. What we do know is that blood cleansing herbs

contain high levels of iron and sulphur and seem to help the immune system clean itself. Consider herbs like Echinacea, Garlic, Horsetail, Red Clover and Burdock as some of the more popular Alterative.

Recent study I have undertaken suggests that the microbiota actually is responsible for stimulating certain functions of the metabolism (via the microbes residing in the appendix of humans or in the caecum in horses) and it is my assertion that herbal tonics enter the gut and stimulate these areas first, preparing the system via messages to all other parts of body involved – triggering the healing response.

I make a beautiful equine herbal alterative tonic for horses that contains stimulating alterative herbs which I prescribe regularly for the purpose of clearing oedema, endocrine balance, infection and metabolic waste.

The results speak for itself when infections are cleared, lumps and bumps disappear and animals are healthy and glowing.

Ranch Horse Classes DEMYSTIFIED

Experts answer your questions about APHA's Ranch Horse events and streamline competition rules to help you and your Paint ride into this exciting group of classes.

Are you interested in competing in APHA's Ranch Horse Classes? If so, you might be feeling a bit dazed and confused about what these classes involve, how they're scored and what exactly judges are looking for in a winning ranch horse-and-rider team.

The Paint Horse Journal turned to some of APHA's Ranch Horse experts - Director of Judges Dave Dellin, Director of Youth Activities and Awards Christine Henry and APHA judge Chris Jeter - to answer the most commonly asked questions and debunk misconceptions. Our panel of pros also streamlines the rules for APHA Ranch Horse competition and explains how these classes are scored to help you and your

Paint get started in this fun group of classes, whether you're a showring veteran or a first-time competitor.

WHAT ARE RANCH HORSE **CLASSES?**

Four different classes comprise APHA's Ranch Horse competition: Ranch Pleasure, Ranch Trail, Ranch Reining and Ranch Cow Work. Ranch Horse competition can be offered at an APHA-approved show as well as in conjunction with all-breed Ranch events that apply for APHA special event status.

In addition to these four classes, APHA offers Ranch Riding, a standalone pattern

class that also evaluates a Ranch Horse's skill and movement. This class follows APHA's own rules and scoring system (outlined in the APHA Rule Book).

Dave explains that, in Ranch Horse Classes, horses are evaluated on the traits judges would find desirable in authentic Ranch Horses - those whose real job is fulfilling the necessary duties of a working ranch.

"The overarching factor judges are looking for in all Ranch Classes is the horse who would be the smoothest, most comfortable and the easiest to handle while riding all day doing a job on a real ranch," Dave said.

Facing Left: To clear confusion, APHA has aligned Ranch Class Names with those offered by the Stock Horse of Texas and American Stock Horse Association.

Facing Right: Both ASHA and SHOT rules are acceptable for APHA Ranch Classes. At APHA special events – like a Ranch Horse Show offering an APHA-specific division – shows must declare what rules judges will follow at least one hour before competition.

HOW ARE RANCH HORSE CLASSES SCORED?

The four Ranch Horse Classes are offered by two different organisations: the American Stock Horse Association and the Stock Horse Association of Texas. These Associations use two different scoring systems. ASHA judges give riders a score of 0 to 10 per manoeuvre; SHOT exhibitors are judged on a 70-base score, meaning they enter the arena with a 70 and their score then goes up or down (+1½ to -1½) per manoeuvre – similar to the scoring system used in APHA's Reining and Trail Classes.

Dave says APHA has made a number of changes to its ranch classes over the last few years, and the most recent rule change allows Show Managers to choose whether they want to align their shows with ASHA or SHOT's rules and scoring systems.

"We did this so judges at a Ranch Horse Show offering APHA classes don't have to give two different scores for the same manoeuvre on the same run," Dave explained. "The way things happened before, judges would have two scribes – one scribing on the 70-base score and one scribing on the 0 to 10 system – and they would have to mentally do the math comparison and say '+1½' to one scribe and '8' to the other scribe."

This rule change simplifies the scoring process for judges, and exhibitors should rest assured that APHA accepts placings from both scoring systems. Christine explains that all points acquired in Ranch Horse Classes are based on APHA Rule SC-060.1, which outlines the Association's point scale based on exhibitors' placings within a class.

"The differences between SHOT and ASHA's rules are minimal except for their scoring systems," Dave said. "Other than the way points are tallied, the class rules are very similar."

APHA rules mandate that Show Managers announce which Association they have aligned with at least one hour before the show starts; most, however, make the announcement months in advance on the show bill.

"The overarching factor judges are looking for in all Ranch Classes is the horse who would be the smoothest, most comfortable and the easiest to handle while riding all day doing a job on a real ranch."

WHY IS THERE CONFUSION AROUND THESE CLASSES?

Dave believes much of the confusion stems from exhibitor's lack of understanding on how they're being scored and is also due to the growing popularity of Ranch Horse Classes and the many first-time competitors and Show Managers.

"There are more Show Managers incorporating these classes into their shows — many of whom have never put on a Ranch Show before — and there are more exhibitors participating who have never done Ranch Horse Shows before," Dave said. "I think this combination of first-time managers and exhibitors is one of the primary causes of confusion. There are a lot of new people getting into these classes and the rules and regulations and how the classes are scored are new to them."

The ranch class names might also have caused additional confusion. For example, Dave says many riders assume Ranch Pleasure is a rail class, in which multiple horses compete in the arena together similar to Western Pleasure. In actuality, exhibitors in Ranch Pleasure compete individually. Some adjustments to class names also occurred a few years ago, in order to align APHA's offerings with SHOT and ASHA.

"Some of the confusion probably stems from when we changed the name of Ranch Riding about three years ago," Dave said. "Ranch Riding was called Ranch Pleasure when it first came out, so a lot of people thought it was a rail class."

HOW ARE RANCH CLASSES DIFFERENT FROM THEIR SISTER EVENTS, SUCH AS RANCH REINING VS. REINING OR RANCH TRAIL VS. TRAIL?

In Ranch Classes, Dave says horses are evaluated on the traits judges would find desirable in horses that work on a ranch for a living – practical skills usually outweigh flashy showring moves.

"Some manoeuvres, like the big sliding stops you see in Reining patterns, don't hold as much value in Ranch Reining because they're not practical for a real Ranch Horse," Dave explained. "It would actually be very dangerous to do a rundown to a stop and then slide 30 feet out in a pasture."

Chris says the primary difference between Ranch Horse Classes and their sister events is that the Ranch Horse will be "handled" more, meaning judges are looking for the horse they would want to ride all day – not just for 10 or 15 minutes in the show ring.

"When we first started showing horses, almost all of them were real ranch horses who came to town to compete on the weekend and then go back to work on the ranch," Chris explained. "The best horse in all of the ranch classes is the one who can do all of these tasks with the least amount of cueing. On a ranch, this would allow the cowboy to be focused on the ranch. The most athletic, best-minded horse is as much — or even more — of an asset than the cowboy on a ranch."

Ranch Pleasure vs. Western Pleasure

In Ranch Pleasure, judges are looking for horses that cover more ground than horses in Western Pleasure — on a ranch, you would want your horse to be able to get across the ranch in a shorter amount of time to check fences, cattle or water sources, for instance. Judges are also evaluating a ranch pleasure horse's ability to be smooth and comfortable to ride while travelling from one ranch duty to the next.

Ranch Reining vs. Reining

In Ranch Reining, judges are looking for horses who are quick and athletic, but also those who would be more practical on a ranch. Running, stopping and sliding past a cow would be undesirable on the ranch, so the long stops you see in regular Reining patterns aren't as sought-after in Ranch Reining.

Ranch Trail vs. Trail

In Ranch Trail, horse-and-rider teams navigate more realistic obstacles than in trail – similar to those they would encounter on a real ranch, such as natural logs, plywood bridges, and water or brush obstacles. Ranch Trail Horses are also required to perform tasks that would be among the daily chores of an authentic

Ranch Horse, including a rope drag, crossing natural ditches, riding up embankments or putting on a slicker.

Ranch Cow Work vs. Working Cow Horse

In ranch cow work, competitors not only have to control a cow – box and turn it – they're also required to rope and stop a cow like they would have to on a real ranch.

WHAT TYPE OF TACK IS LEGAL/ ILLEGAL? AND WHAT ABOUT BREASTCOLLARS AND REAR CINCHES?

While ASHA and SHOT have similar rules regarding tack, Dave advises Ranch Horse exhibitors to become familiar with both Associations' rulebooks to determine what tack can be used, as the specific rules will depend on which Association the Show Manager chooses to align with at any given APHA ranch show.

Both ASHA and SHOT require horses to be shown in a Western stock saddle and either a snaffle, bosal or curb bit, and both Associations prohibit the use of tie-downs, cavessons, gag bits, mechanical hackamores and running martingales.

Breastcollars and rear cinches are legal in all Ranch Horse Classes under ASHA and SHOT's rules, and Dave says both are encouraged in the APHA Rule Book.

"Breastcollars and back cinches are recommended for safety purposes," Chris said. "In general, both help hold the saddle in place, but imagine what might happen if you roped a big calf out in the middle of nowhere on a ranch without a breastcollar or rear cinch – it could result in a big wreck. Both pieces of equipment can be great assets, and in our Ranch Classes they offer more security in both the Cow Work and Trail Classes – providing an extra measure of safety for both horse and rider."

WILL SILVER ON TACK DISQUALIFY AN EXHIBITOR?

While both ASHA and SHOT discourage the use of silver on a saddle or bridle, Dave says it's not illegal and will not result in a disqualification. Equipment with silver, however, will not result in a higher score over clean, functional stock equipment in good repair.

"Silver is discouraged in Ranch Classes because judges are evaluating which horse they would want to ride all day performing





duties on a ranch," Dave explained. "Silver would only weigh a real Ranch Horse down and prevent him from doing his job to the best of his ability."

CAN ANY HORSE OF ANY AGE **BE RIDDEN TWO-HANDED?**

Yes, with a caveat. Dave says a horse of any age can be ridden two-handed in any piece of legal equipment. In Ranch Horse Classes, legal two-handed equipment includes a smooth snaffle bit or a hackamore; horses shown in a curb bit must be ridden one-handed - using two hands with a curb bit or using more than one finger between split reins will result in a 5-point penalty per manoeuvre.

"Unlike English classes, riders competing in Ranch Horse events cannot ride twohanded in a twisted-wire snaffle bit," Dave said. "You can only ride two-handed in a smooth snaffle in ranch classes."

WHAT'S THE DEAL WITH MANE LENGTH AND HOOF BLACK?

While braided or banded manes and artificial hair extensions are prohibited, Dave says there are no rules regarding mane length, so a ranch horse's mane can be long, short or roached, hoof black, how-

ever, is not allowed in any of the Ranch Horse Classes.

"Banded manes and hoof black are illegal in Ranch Horse Classes because neither are used on a ranch - they are solely a byproduct of horse shows," Chris explained. "The goal is to keep ranch classes representative of the working Ranch Horse."

WHY CAN'T MY HORSE CROSS **OVER BETWEEN SOME EVENTS?** AND WHAT ARE THE PROHIBITED **CROSSOVERS?**

Dave says APHA's Ranch Horse Classes were designed to encourage new riders and their Paint Horses to try APHA competition, and therefore crossing over to Ranch Horse from certain classes (within the same show) is prohibited.

"Allowing the same horses that have been successful in Ranch Horse's sister events defeats that purpose," Dave said. "Through APHA's Ranch Horse Classes, we're striving to create new opportunities for new riders and new horses to showcase their talents in a different capacity."

Chris says certain crossovers are prohibited because the Ranch Horse is by nature a jack-of-all-trades, while the show horse might be a specialist in a certain event. "Crossovers are prohibited for a good reason, and that is to keep in perspective what we are looking for in the ideal Ranch Horse - one who is good at everything and the one we would want to ride all day," Chris said. "A specialist doesn't get to work on the ranch, do his one job and be done; there's more work to be done. So prohibiting certain crossovers keeps the Ranch Horse Classes true to their purpose."

Consult ASHA and SHOT's rulebooks for a full list of prohibited crossovers, but the prevailing rule is that horses competing in a Western Pleasure/Hunter Under Saddle, Trail, Reining or Cow Work Class cannot cross over to the sister Ranch Horse Class within the same show. Dave says, however, that riders can cross over to these classes at different shows - meaning a horse can compete in Working Cow Horse one weekend and Ranch Cow Work the next.

HOW MANY HORSES CAN ONE EXHIBITOR SHOW IN RANCH HORSE CLASSES?

Dave says riders in Open Classes can show up to five horses; Amateur and Youth riders

are permitted to show up to three horses. Ranch Horse Classes are not offered in Junior or Senior divisions.

HOW DOES APHA'S YEAR-END RANCH HORSE AWARD WORK?

Christine says APHA's High Point Ranch Horse Awards are offered in any division with a qualifying exhibitor (in Amateur and Youth) or a qualifying horse (in Open) who has earned at least one point in Ranch Pleasure, Ranch Trail, Ranch Reining and Ranch Cow Work. In all qualifying divisions, the High Point Ranch Horse receives a trophy Ranch Horse saddle.

"In past years, the divisions have been Open, Amateur, Novice Amateur, Solid Paint Bred and Youth," Christine said. "However, if there are qualifying horses or exhibitors in another division, there will be an award."

In addition to the High Point Ranch Horse Awards, exhibitors can also earn Honor Roll awards, Registers of Merits and Superior awards in each individual Ranch Class. Yearend Top 20 and Zone Top Five Awards are also available for Ranch Pleasure, Ranch Trail, Ranch Reining, Ranch Cow Work and Ranch Riding.

TAKEAWAY

Hopefully, you now have a better understanding of how APHA's Ranch Horse Classes operate. Be sure, however, to consult both partner Associations' websites for a full list of rules, regulations and class specifics to help you and your Paint get started in this fun, new group of classes.
