

PRESIDENTS REPORT - by craig Dengate

Hello again, let me first address what is probably on the minds of our Paint Horse members. The equine influenza and the potential time frame where this condition can be eliminated and the restriction of horse movement can be removed so we can get back to normal life with our horses as we knew it.

At this point in time no one has a crystal ball, but according to the informed concensus restrictions may still be in place up until April 2008; and of course this depends on the reduction of newly diagnosed horses with this condition. I'm sure all of our show people are asking the question about the 2008 National Show, my personal opinion, where physically possible there will be a 2008 PHAA National Show. Our Board members have been discussing possible alternatives and scenarios and an announcement will be made after the next BOD meeting in early December.

On another point our office has received a few calls stating that they would not renew their membership with the PHAA if there wasn't going to be a National Show in 2008. I'm sure our horse industry people have been affected in various shapes or forms, to those people who rely on this industry as their major source of income my thoughts go out to you. To the majority of our members who receive income from other employment situations, I need to express to you at this point in time the PHAA has always and will always be a not for profit association, formed for the benefit of its members and their Paint Horses. To continue to maintain the effective running of our Association at this point in time, our Association will need you to continue to participate in the membership of our Association. Whilst our National Show is used to showcase and promote our Paint Horses there is so much more the Paint Horse Association of Australia offers to its members. For your

commitment you receive, subscription for Paint Horse Journal, access to website, registration and transferring of horses, honour roll awards, Ride Australia, lifetime points, recognition for your horse and through all these programs the opportunity to get together with your fellow Paint Horse member and enjoy the recreational lifestyle. So I encourage all members to consider our Association and its future.

I had the opportunity to attend the 2007 American Paint Horse Association Convention held in Louisville, Kentucky, conducted between the 3rd and 6th of October. Once again the APHA extended a warm welcome to the International visitors from Australia which included Jeffrey and Lee Ann Hall, Karen and myself. I would sincerely like to thank APHA for enabling us to be involved and welcomed at this function. several days we were able to attend educational and informative seminars, I also attended the general members meeting which once again reaffirmed my understanding of how similar the business of our Association here in Australia is to the American Paint Horse Association. The similarity members, the family orientated direction, the topics discussed and proposed, the only major difference is the size and scale. APHA have approximately 100,000 members, PHAA have approximately 1500 members. I also had the opportunity to communicate with the Executive Committee members and Presidents of APHA to further my



experience and enable me to be more effective back here in Australia. I sincerely enjoyed my experience and look forward to the future involvement of both the PHAA and APHA working together for the betterment of Paint Horses world wide.

Recently I received an email from a reasonably new PHAA member who had their first experience of an overo lethal white foal being born on her property. Obviously this was quite distressing to her, currently the PHAA does not recommend breeding OLWS positive horses together because of the potential of producing an overo lethal white foal. The Association will endeavor to be more informative about the aspects on breeding OLWS horses but in some cases it is often a prospective PHAA member who may be unaware of the potential issues buying a mare that is in foal because they want to own a Paint Horse. I strongly feel that where possible it is the responsibility of all our PHAA members that breed horses to inform and enlighten other potential Paint Horse owners about the possibility of producing lethal white foals.

PORTFOLIO REPORT - by Angela Newton

[Breed Improvement]

- Genetics-

A report taken from equinecolor.com on the findings presented at an Equine Genetics conference in August at Tahoe City.

A Swedish genetics group has found the mutation that causes Gray. The group presented their results determining that gray is actually not a simple base pair mutation, like most of the coat colours. It is actually caused by a large duplication of sequence in an intron of the "gray gene". The paper is still in press, and based on some interesting findings when they tested 700 gray horses:

- 1. Homozygous grays go gray faster than heterozygotes.
- 2. Heterozygous grays have a much higher incidence of speckling (also called flea-bitten gray).
- 3. Homozygous grays have a much higher incidence of melanomas.
- 4. Homozygous grays have a much higher incidence of vitiligo.
- 5. And this is the crazy part...horses that are "aa" at agouti have a much higher chance of getting melanomas than horses that are AA or Aa.

The majority of these finding are due to the way that the gray mutation works...the mutation causes a hyperproliferation of melanocytes (which collect as melanomas), but that leaves fewer melanocytes for the hair follicles, causing the horse to progressively gray with age.

The Swiss group has also identified the dominant white mutation. It is a single

base pair change in the KIT gene which is responsible for many depigmentation problems. Photos of horses tested positive for the mutation proved that these horses were not max sabinos. They were white, sometimes with some skin pigmentation, but none in the coat. All of the white horses tested heterozygous for the mutation. Homozygotes, as suspected by breeding trials, are not viable. Dominant white was previously mapped to KIT in 2004, but the mutation has now been identified and it is possible test horses for it. It is not always fully penetrant, leading some to the incorrect conclusion that the horses were actually sabino.

Dominant white has been identified in a number of breeds but it is considered very rare and not known to exist in Paints or Quarter Horses.

Dun: UC Davis continues to narrow down the dun gene. While they haven't found the mutation yet, they now have the region narrowed to two candidate genes. They're in the process of sequencing them for mutations. Hopefully dun will be found soon.

Another group attempted to map the Splash White gene, but was not really successful.



Non-traditional non-competitive

- With Dressage popularity increasing at the National Show I've prepared an article on the relevant EFA rules. Currently the PHAA is not EFA affiliated but we use EFA Judges and are expected to meet their standards. These are by no means the full EFA rulebook as we are considered Hors Concours (HC) (also referred to as non-competitive) and the rule book in its entirety does not apply. EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS


The European Paint Horse Championships (EPHC) were held in Kreuth, near Amberg, Bavaria in mid September. This proven location is able to host comfortably the largest western events and is well attended by international as well as local exhibitors. The facility has a great infrastructure, a wide variety of lodging possibilities right on the fairgrounds, and plenty of space for both the exhibitor and the visitors (just to name a couple of advantages that Kreuth offers). The impressive indoor and outdoor riding arenas of the Ostbayernhalle are inviting and convenient for warming up and showing horses.

Since 2003 the EPHC has grown to be the largest American Paint Horse Show outside of North America. Growing participation, new classes and divisions help to increase the number of exhibitors, allow them to earn more APHA points and other awards.

In 2005, it was decided that the EPHC should be held annually. Representatives from the European Paint Horse Clubs contribute their ideas to improve the show each year. The Nations Cup has become a special highlight of the EPHC. Participating teams from different European countries compete for the coveted Gist Buckle awards and their medallions. Switzerland won in 2004, Italy won the second year, and Germany took the title in 2006. Read more about the EPHC in this issue.

2007 APHA CONVENTION LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY USA.

The Kentucky Paint Horse Club was the host of the 2007 APHA Convention held October 3rd through to 6th in Louisville, Kentucky. Each year APHA Convention is held in a different State of the USA and hosted by one of APHA's Regional Clubs. Last year Convention was held in San Antonio, Texas, the venue for 2008 will be San Diego, California and 2009 will be Colorado Springs, Colorado.





THE Kentucky Paint Horse Club was the host of the 2007 APHA Convention held October 3rd through to 6th in Louisville, Kentucky. Each year APHA Convention is held in a different state of the USA and hosted by one of APHA's Regional Clubs. Last year Convention was held in San Antonio, Texas, the venue for 2008 will be San Diego, California and 2009 will be Colorado Springs, Colorado.

APHA Convention is not only the "Annual General Meeting" of the Association it is a friendly, social gathering of many of APHA's active and past members. Held over 4 days, the various committees meet to discuss business and to put forward their recommendations and reports, social trips are held, educational speakers attend dinners, new directors are installed, the Executive Committee announced and rule changes put to the vote.

Not surprising, with the enormity of APHA and its membership, the structure of its meetings and voting are vastly different from PHAA, though PHAA could improve its own structure by taking note of some of the procedures taken by APHA. Particularly in the area of rule changes - their frequency and method of adoption. There are in excess of 100 APHA Directors, of which 7 are elected annually to the Executive Committee. The Directorship meet twice per year as a group at Convention and also at APHA Workshop (held annually in early June), through out the year the Executive Committee meet several times as do most of the Directors in their various committees.

As with all APHA functions, nothing is left to chance with professionalism shining through. APHA staff are on hand to welcome attendees and to provide useful information and publications. The venue was the historic Brown Hotel in central Louisville, the city that is home to The Kentucky Derby and Churchill Downs.

The Committees that held meetings during the

period of Convention included -Executive. American Paint Horse Foundation, Judges, Ways and Means, Youth, Long Range Planning, Amateur, Breed Improvement, General Show & Contest, Professional Horseman, Recreational Riding, Registration, Rules and International. Out of each meeting the Chairman of the Committee will deliver the Committees findings and recommendations to the Directorship on the final morning of Convention. This is then taken further and the reports will be put back to the appropriate committee/s at the following vears APHA Workshop before any rule changes will be considered at the next APHA Convention. Everything thoroughly researched and thought through. Rule changes that have come about from these meetings or members suggestions to the committees are not made on the spot.

APHA hosted a Seminar covering the duties and responsibilities of a Judges

"Scribe" and the use of Score Sheets. A hands on seminar with APHA Judge Mike Short at the helm, attendees were able to actively participate in live scribing with Mike being the judge, calling the scores and penalties from video footage of events from previous APHA World Shows. The importance of a good and thorough scribe were noted, in particular to the confidence a judge must be able to hold in their scribe. Some Show Management issues were also discussed during the Scribe Workshop.

The General Membership meeting was held on Thursday October 4th. Everyone is welcome to attend this meeting, Directors, APHA members and their guests. It is during this meeting that APHA Annual Reports are presented and Rule Changes are put to the vote. Only APHA Directors and their voting Alternates (similar to a proxy, in the absence of a director) are entitled to vote on the motions that are presented.

In all there were 43 rule changes presented of which 40 were passed. Most were presented, discussed and promptly voted in, a few were hotly debated. Rule changes covered a variety of issues, general membership rules, show etiquette, attire, equipment, specific events, amateur and youth.

Later that evening the Kentucky Paint Horse Club (KPHC) sponsored a Dinner Cruise on a paddle steamer down the Ohio River. It was a lovely balmy evening with good food, fun speakers and a few prizes and giveaways. Two coach loads of people attended, with APHA staff member (and tireless worker) Theresa Anderson ensuring nobody missed their spot.

Breakfast the following morning was made interesting with the KPHC President Craig Wood presenting some facts and figures on the horse industry in Kentucky. A presentation covering the Kentucky State Government Horse Breeders Incentive program was given, a very interesting program financially benefiting Kentucky based stallion owners and the owners of the progeny of these Kentucky based sires. Breeds that benefit are Appaloosa, Arabian, Hackney, Morgan, Mountain Horse, Paint Horse, Paso Fino, Quarter Horse, Saddlebred, Walking Horse and Thoroughbred. The Incentive is funded from taxes paid on stallion breeding services and paid back to eligible horse owners and breeders on a dollar / point basis. It is a very interesting concept and had paid out in excess of \$1 million in the first year. You can read more about the Paint Horse section on the following link -

Guest speaker for lunch was Dr Bryan Findlay of Rood & Riddle Equine Hospital, a hospital that specialises in Equine Podiatry. Dr Findlay had a very graphic visual presentation that I am certain may have interfered with the appetite of some of the members present. Explaining some of the difficult cases that had been treated recently at the hospital with before, during and after shots presented,

including many shots of work using medical grade maggots. Not for anyone with a weak stomach. The work this hospital has done is amazing, to see some of the hoof and lower leg issues that were presented to the hospital and later to see the recovery was nothing short of incredible. Committees resumed meetings for the rest of the day.

Friday evening was the Presidential Inauguration Dinner with entertainment by the Joe Freeman Bluegrass band. Carl Thurow, 2008 APHA President was welcomed by outgoing President Richard Cox and Past President, Carl Parker was thanked for the work that he has done during his 8 years on the Executive Committee. Formalities complete and the entertainment began. The band was a lot of fun, a little redneck at times with their jokes, inviting APHA members to join in. I didn't realise that people can still play the spoons (Karen Thomas, Texas) and that Elite Amateurs can get down and boogie so well (Renee Robinson, Texas).

The final day sees the Standing Committees deliver their reports. **Some issues that were bought to light:**

<u>Amateur Portfolio</u>: Mike Short. The Amateur Rule is to be revised at 2008 Workshop.

<u>Breed Improvement</u>: Clint Fullerton. The current colour rule is to be revised, a proposal will be put forward at Workshop. Does not support World Show split.

Show & Contest: Ron Shelley. World Show needs to be split. Suggestions for either a Youth World Show (using present World Show Dates) and an Open / Amateur World Show in November or moving the young horse events (Weanling, Yearling & 2 Year Old) to a November show and including additional slot classes at the new show. Executive Committee to take further. Recommended participation based qualifying for World Show. Subjects of Snaffle Bits, Hackamores, use of lip chains and halter class behaviour to be discussed at Workshop.

Registration: Brian Zimmerman. Colour Rule to be reconsidered at Workshop. Two proposals will be put forward. Recommend to split World Show.

<u>Judges</u>: Brad Perkins. Recommend minimum age for APHA judges to be 21.

Convention was closed with lunch and a tour of Churchill Downs, home of the 132 year old Kentucky Derby. The Kentucky Derby is the oldest continuous sporting event held in the USA. Not only is Convention the Annual General Meeting for the membership it is an educational event that brings members together from all over the USA and the World in a fun and family atmosphere. I am looking forward to Convention 2008 in San Diego!



TUCKED between the rolling hills, thick forests and picturesque towns of Germany's Bavaria, not far from the borders of the Czech Republic, Austria and Switzerland, lies one of Europe's premier equestrian facilities. The "Mecca" for Western horse lovers is Gut Matheshof, which hosts 30 equine events a year in Kreuth, Germany. And for the first time, the Bavarians warmly welcomed the 2007 European Paint Horse Championships (EPHC), held September 11-16.

Undoubtedly, this was no ordinary event. Horses and riders from Finland to France, and spectators from Great Britain to the Czech Republic, came together under one roof to enjoy some of the best competition and camaraderie the breed has to offer in Europe. Bringing together 240 horses from 13 countries, the EPHC is the largest APHA-approved show outside of North America. With 768 entries, the show was 10 percent bigger than last year.

From the inaugural Novice Amateur classes to Europe's first Gelding Plus award winners, there was plenty to celebrate, with more than 150 medals awarded over five days. Catch the highlights of this European Paint Horse celebration and meet the stars of the show.

Taking the lead

While most Europeans tend to prefer all-around horses, Italy has taken the lead in halter. Of the 49 medals awarded in halter classes, more than one-third went to Italian horses. What makes this even more remarkable is that the Italians brought only 22 horses, winning 18 medals in halter, and another 17 in performance events.

Leading the Italian halter powerhouse were two "kids" from Verona—Heza Kid For Sure and Step Kid.

Despite his young age—Heza Kid For Sure is only a weanling—the sorrel overo was named Grand Champion Stallion by four of the five judges. The colt was bred and is owned by Marco Bertazzoni of Verona, Italy, and exhibited by Roy Donn.

Step Kid was also named Grand Champion Stallion, in addition to earning the European champion title in Aged Stallions. Exhibited by Roy Donn, the 2003 sorrel overo is owned by Luciano Grisanti of Verona, Italy.

And no one could get past this big bad girl of halter—KB Ima Lil Ms Imprint. She won both Aged Mares with Francois Lejour and Youth Mares with Felix Lejour under all five judges, successfully defending the two European champion titles earned last year in Aachen. Beating her performance last year, the 2002 red dun overo was named Grand Champion Mare, again under all five judges. "Ima" is owned by Felix Lejour and Sandra Dahl of Conflans Ste Honorine, France.

The excellent facility in Kreuth attracted the creme de la creme of European Paint reiners, who came to spin, run and slide in the sand in the Ostbayernhalle arena.

In the Junior reining, Whiz N Nanny and her rider Michel Sandyck went all out to claim the gold and the European champion title. Running APHA pattern 5, the team turned in a score of 216.5 to best 11 other entries. The 2002 sorrel tobiano mare is owned by Roy De Bruin of Bergschenhock, The Netherlands.

Paint reining fans caught some spectacular action in the Senior reining, with several top horses in the field of 16. But no one could out-slide Gatling Gun. The 1999 sorrel overo stallion brought home a score of 217, the gold and the title of European champion for owner and rider Steffen Breug of Reichweiler, Germany.

An award to remember

New to the European Championships, APHA awarded three magnificent bronze trophies featuring three Paint Horse heads. Created by reknown sculptor Marrita McMillian, the statues were awarded to the all-around horses in the Open, Amateur and Youth divisions.

Beating seasoned competitors to capture the all-around Open award was Made Invest In Dream, owned by Linda Fighera of Sala d'Istrana, Italy. The 2006 sorrel overo mare won European championships in halter, yearling longe line and yearling in-hand trail. For her accomplishments, Linda received a personalized bronze trophy from APHA.

The newly revamped Gelding Plus Program made its European debut this year. All owners of registered Paint geldings aged 4-years-old and older were eligible for the \$1,000 prizes awarded by APHA at the European Championships.



Taking home a Gelding Plus paycheck in the Open division was Sheiks Artist, owned by Maria Donelli of Virgilio, Italy. The 2002 sorrel tobiano gelding earned \$1,000, winning reserve European championship titles in halter, junior Western pleasure and junior trail.

In the Amateur division, Joys Skip N Bars captured both the all-around and Gelding Plus awards for Nicole Beschorner. The duo won European championships in horsemanship, Senior hunter under saddle and hunt-seat equitation, plus reserves in senior Western pleasure and trail. In addition to a slew of medals, Nicole received a personalized bronze trophy and \$1,000 from APHA. The 1999 bay tobiano is owned by Manfred Beschorner of Renningen, Germany.

A new start

Six new Novice Amateur performance classes were added to the schedule, giving first-time exhibitors a perfect opportunity to compete against their peers. To kick off the program, European Novice Amateur Circuit Champion titles and 14 medals were presented.


The All-Around Youth title went to Alena Helmcke and Shes Doolins Nikita. The equestrienne from Appel, Germany, and her 2001 black tobiano mare won European championships in Youth showmanship, Western pleasure and hunter under saddle, as well as a reserve in hunt seat equitation. Alena also received a personalized bronze trophy from the APHA. This year's winner of the Gelding Plus award in the Youth division is Shilohsspotted Star, owned and exhibited by Heike Strambach of Baumenheim, Germany. With her 1996 red roan overo, Heike won the European championship in trail, the reserve championship in showmanship, and \$1,000 from APHA.


Unlike their American cousins, Europeans show their solid Paint-bred horses in greater numbers. At the EPHC, 11 percent of the entries were in solid Paint-bred classes.

"I've been very impressed with the number and quality of the solid Paint-breds here," said Richard Cox, then president of APHA. "The number of solid Paint-bred classes here will encourage more people to show them. We haven't been able to achieve those numbers in the United States."

Winning top honors for the second consecutive year is Ulrike Mohr and Buddys Bourbon, taking the all-around solid Paint-bred Amateur champion title. The duo earned gold medals and European champion titles in halter, hunter under saddle and hunt-seat equitation. Ulrike and the 1999 solid sorrel gelding hail from Bensheim, Germany.

It was no illusion when Magic Technique won the all-around solid Paint-bred champion award in both the Open and Youth divisions. The 2002 sorrel solid mare earned gold medals and European champion titles in Western pleasure and trail with owner Angelika Gallitzendorfer of Memmingen, Germany. Jennifer Dolpp showed the mare in Youth classes to gold and European champion titles in halter and trail.





In the end...

It's hard to say who enjoyed the final evening performance more—the spectators or the exhibitors. The Nations Cup gave equestrians the rare opportunity to ride on a team and those in the stands the fun of cheering for their country. This year was particularly exciting with more teams than ever battling for the Gist Silversmith buckles donated by APHA.

With the home team advantage, the Germans were fully prepared to defend their 2006 Cup win. Traditionally, The Netherlands, Sweden and Italy had sent strong teams. However, the motivation of Austria, Denmark and Switzerland—who had either entered for the first time or had missed the last competition—couldn't be disregarded.

Each team selected four or five horses and riders to compete in trail, hunter under saddle, Western pleasure, horsemanship and reining. Each couple was limited to one event, and the team's lowest score was dropped.

Italy immediately took the lead after the first event, trail, and maintained it going into the last, reining. Once the low scores were dropped, the Italians were tied with the Germans. The tie was broken using a pre-selected judge in the horsemanship class, putting the Germans on top.

The winning German team members were Viktoria Kramer riding A Special Luck, Ulrike Mohr riding Buddys Bourbon, Alena Helmcke riding Shes Doolins Nikita, Verena Hagen riding Tinys Little Deer and Torsten Tiemann riding Julias Flying Delta.

Horsemen and women came from across Europe to the EPHC to compete, to learn and to celebrate the passion they share for the Paint Horse. The memories and the friendships made there will carry them home and back again next year. The 2008 European Paint Horse Championship location and dates will be announced in the Paint Horse Journal and online at ephc.info.

Joelene Gleeson is the quintessential horse mad country girl. Not only does she break in and make her own horses at the tender age of 22, but earlier this year she took on the big boys in the 2007 Cloncurry Stockmans Challenge with her Paint mare Sweet Peppy Sioux.

SWEET Peppy Sioux – 7715 is a chestnut overo by Peppy Doc Bar out of Glens Sweet Sioux. Joelene bought her as an unbroken 2 1/2 yr old and with her dad Tom started the mare under saddle just before Christmas 2006. Sioux had only competed at two other events, the Springsure and Alpha Challenges before taking on Cloncurry. Since then they placed in the Stonehenge Draft and Sioux with Joelene's youngest sister Whitney on board won the Ladies Draft at Muttaburra.

Whilst Sioux's sire Peppy Doc Bar is legendary to many of us, her dam Glens Sweet Sioux is also a prolific producer and the dam of the following:

NRHA Non Pro Futurity Champ.
PHAA National Halter Champ.
Bandit 303 (by Peppys Painted Bandit):

Bandit 303 (by Peppys Painted Bandit): PHAA National Halter Champ Campdraft winner.

Sweet Peppy Sioux (by Peppys Doc Bar): 8th Cloncurry Stockmans Challenge finalist. Siouxs Destiny (By Marnies Destiny): 3 yr old currently in training for campdrafting. Hickory Sioux (by Hickory Star) currently in WA 2 yr old currently been broken in for cutting with Keith Murray.

Out of 80 starters Joelene was the only woman to make it to the final and finished with a credible 8th out of the 13 finalists. Aside from her top ten placing, she won a trophy for the highest placed woman and L & B Miller presented to her a yearling gelding from their Rhondu Stud for being the highest scoring youngster.

Joelene's success in the Challenge did not occur overnight. She was born at Alpha, QLD into a campdrafting family. Her father Tom drafts as do her two younger sisters Annalise and Whitney. The Gleeson family lived in Western Australia for a period where she was a Jillaroo on a number of properties including Bulla Bulla, Kimberly Downs, Ruby Plains and Halls Creek. She is employed by Teys Bros at Sedgeford a cattle property located west of Rockhampton where she has the opportunity to keep her horses in work. In 2006 aside from campdrafts and challenges, Joelene also attended 27 rodeos winning the CRCA end of year Rookie Barrel Racing title and was runner up for the Open.

But aside from the genetics and talent, this tale tells of commitment because in 2002 a horse that Joelene was riding fell and crashed on her. Her pelvis was broken in 3 places. Most people would be lucky to be even walking again but after a 12 month recovery period she was back on a horse and competing. This year's run in the Cloncurry Challenge was Joelene's 4th attempt but expectations are that we'll be hearing more about this country girl in the future.

Dressage

Rules and Procedures With EFA Tests

With the increased popularity of the Dressage competition at the National Show and many of the State Shows; the following extract from the Equestrian Federation of Australia rule book is provided to assist members with some of the relevant rules. If you need more information the full EFA rulebook is available on line at www.equestrian.org.au

General Information and Rules

The EFA has a code of conduct for the welfare of the horse which states in brief "At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands". Horses and competitors must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. Events must not prejudice horse welfare. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. *For a full description of their welfare rules please refer to the complete rulebook.

Associate Competitions

- Riders must be a member of one of the following:
 - o the EFA of at least Associate level
 - o the affiliated club/organisation conducting the event. There is no restriction on age. One rider per horse is permitted at any event.
- Horses
 - EFA registration is not required. There is no restriction on the height of the horse. If a horse is, or has been graded, it may only compete at its graded level or above or HC in a lower level. Horses must be aged 3 yrs and over.
- Tests
 - Max consecutive levels to be entered are
 2. Max tests to be ridden in one day
 (includes Official, Associate and
 Freestyles) are 3.

Rider Conduct

• Riding with the reins in both hands is compulsory in all Dressage

- competitions.
- After bell has sounded, the competitor should enter the arena at A as soon as possible.
- Failure to enter the arena within 45 seconds of the bell being sounded will entail elimination
- Riders must be mounted on entering and leaving the arena on penalty of elimination.
- A horse leaving the arena with all four feet during a test between the time of entry and the time of exit at A will be eliminated.
- Where callers are allowed, it is the responsibility of the competitor to ensure that only the printed text, or extracts there from, is read and that no other form of assistance is given.
- The caller may read each movement once or twice only. Failure to observe this rule may entail elimination.
- Riders are not permitted to wear headphones during a test
- Any intentional outside intervention by voice, signs etc are considered assistance to a rider or horse and is penalised by elimination.
- The use of the voice by the rider in any way, or clicking the tongue once or repeatedly is a serious fault, involving the deduction of at least 2 marks from those that would otherwise have been awarded for the movement where this occurred. Not all judges will deduct marks as not all judges may have heard the sound.

Dress, Saddlery & Equipment

- Compulsory Dress
 - Preliminary to Elementary levels



- o White, off-white, light canary or beige jodhpurs or breeches
- o Short coat
- Riding boots, either long or short with smooth soles and heels
- o Riders under 18 years approved safety head gear
- o Riders 18 years and over hunt cap, bowler hat or approved safety headgear
- Gloves, tie, stock or ratcatcher
 Optional as defined below
 Spurs, whip, gaiters and/or monkey grip. Military personnel, police etc may wear service dress.

Head Gear

Competing riders must wear head gear applicable to their level of competition. Grooms, when mounted on a horse, must wear approved safety head gear with the retaining harness secured and fastened

Approved safety headgear is to be worn at all times when training or practising at an event. Current approved safety headgear is:

- o AS/NZS 3838 (Current Australian Standard)
- o EN 1384 (Current European Standard)
- o ASTN F1163 (Current US Standard)

Footwear

Whilst mounted, all riders must wear riding boots with smooth soles and heels. For Preliminary to Elementary levels the following boots are permissible. Short boots (black or brown only), Short boots with matching coloured gaiters*, Short boots with matching coloured gaiters* with black or brown hunting tops, Long brown boots, Long boots with hunting tops, Long black boots (top boots).

Spurs

- o Spurs may be worn by competitors at all levels
- o Spurs are compulsory when a double bridle is worn
- o Spurs must be made of metal
- There must be a shank either curved or straight pointing directly back from the centre of the spur when on the rider's boot
- o The tip of the shank must not point up or point inwards
- o The arms of the spur must be smooth
- o If rowels are used, they must be free to rotate
- o There is no maximum length of spurs
- o Spurs with hard plastic knobs are allowed
- o Dummy spurs with no shank are allowed

Whip

A whip, not exceeding 1.2 metres in its entirety (including the tassel), may be carried and used by a competitor in tests up to and including Advanced level at all events including all Championships.

• Coats

The wearing of coats is optional in extreme weather conditions, at the discretion of the OC (organising committee). If a rider chooses to discard their coat, then a shirt must be worn with a rat catcher or normal collar. T shirts are not permitted.

Saddle

Dressage type (including all-purpose) saddle of traditional or treeless construction fully mounted is compulsory, and may be used with or without a saddle cloth.

· Bridles, Nosebands and Bits

· Snaffle Bridle

A snaffle bridle is compulsory in all tests up to and including

Elementary level. A snaffle bridle is optional at Medium level.

> NOSEBANDS

It is compulsory to have one only of the following nosebands on a snaffle bridle:

Dropped noseband, Cavesson noseband, Flash noseband (also known as a Hanoverian noseband), Crossed noseband, also known as a Grackle or Mexican noseband

Nosebands may never be so tightly fixed as to harm the horse. Officials should not loosen the noseband, but request the rider to do so. If the rider refuses and the official thinks the noseband is still too tight, the Ground Jury should be approached to make a ruling. Padding under the noseband is permitted as long as it is securely attached.

> BITS

Only snaffle bits having the following features are approved for use in Dressage. Snaffle bits shall be composed of Metal or Metal and rubber (flexible rubber bits are not permitted) or Metal and synthetic material. Snaffle bits and bridoons made only of metal must meet the following. All parts of the bit coming into the horse's mouth must be of metal (not necessarily the same metal). The diameter of the mouthpiece of both the snaffle bit and the bridoon must be such so as not to hurt the horse. Mouthpieces may be the same thickness or tapered towards the centre or central joints. All parts coming into the horses mouth shall be rounded, smooth and not ridged, sharp or corrugated.

Keeping with the definition above, some of the types of bits permitted are:*

Half moon – port-mouth – curved, Rubber or synthetic bit – both jointed and unjointed, Sweet iron bit

Double Bridle

A double bridle consists or a bridoon (snaffle) and a curb bit. A Pelham bit is not permissible in any dressage test.

> BRIDOON

Must be made of metal or rigid plastic and may be covered with rubber (flexible rubber bits are not permitted). If metal bits are used all parts of the bit coming into the horses mouth must be of metal (not necessarily of the same metal). The mouth piece must be of a diameter so as not the hurt the horse.

> CURB

Pelham bits are not permitted at any time. The limits of the dimensions of the curb bits allowable are as follows. The curb must be made of metal or rigid plastic and may be covered with rubber (flexible rubber bits are not permitted). The lever arm of the curb bit below the mouthpiece should not measure more than 10cm when the mouthpiece is at the uppermost position.

> NOSEBAND

Only a cavesson noseband shall be used with a double bridle. Optional Items (not compulsory)

Lip strap, Leather cover for curb chain, Rubber cover for curb chain

Saddlecloths

A saddlecloth is not compulsory. Saddlecloths bearing the Australian flag may only be worn by a competitor who is officially representing Australia. Sponsors logos may appear on both sides of the saddlecloth and be used in official competitions. Logos must not exceed 200 square centimetres in size, on each side of the saddlecloth.

By this stage both foals were drinking from a bucket and also nursing from the mare, eating hay and grain and playing together well. Poosh was still a little concerned about having two foals in the place of one, but was becoming more comfortable.

Kevin persisted with the routine of caring for the boys and on my return I was confident to allow the mare and foals out to pasture full time. If you didn't know any better you would be right to assume that the mare had twins. Good job Mr Mills! Mare and colts have all been micro-chipped and vaccinated against Equine Influenza while we were away. The mare looks fantastic, she is fat and shiny, has developed a lot of trust in humans and is

now a very friendly mare. The colts are growing rapidly and literally eating like horses and enjoying the freedom of the pasture. Mare and babies are out in the pasture all day and then confined in a yard at night with hay and grain. I am now adding the milk powder to the feed that is given to the colts rather than use bucket milk as it may curdle given the warmer days we are having. I guess the next hurdle will be when we wean the colts from the mare, we may have separation issues with the 2 colts being weaned from each other, but I am sure this will be overcome easily.

A happy ending to a tough start. Although we have lost the mare C-Notes Honey Bee, her colt is as healthy as any other and happy to be a horse. Poosh has become a delight to be around and my work load has reduced dramatically. We hope that you will get to see Jose in the show arena in the future

TELISHA KOTZUR'S PAINT STORY

The Bare Foot Paint SPLASHES OUT!

Artic Norma Jean is my little hero! My mum bought her out of Horse Deals last August.

She was trucked to Darwin and we have been totally amazed by her performance, she was the best C grade Pony Club horse, we discovered she loved jumping especially cross country. Artic Norma Jean brought loads of ribbons home every show or competition. She excelled in the Open classes, we didn't get to do western events as we knew she was highly trained in that

The first day we got her we took her shoes off!! and trimmed her feet and she has been bare foot ever since. We moved to the Yarra Valley in Victoria in June this year and we

signed her up for a Drag Hunt, I was going to take my fast polocrosse horse but was warned to take a slower horse, so Artic Norma Jean's name was put down for the hunt.

We arrived at Lillydale hunt grounds and most horses were big powewrful Clydie crosses I hoped and believed in Artic Norma Jean that she would perform to her best ability, she definitely looked not the part.

Yes you guessed it she had power and speed like I've never felt. She was in front with her head held so high and mighty. She ran the race and didn't refuse one jump!! She had a smlie on her face and so did I.

Yep she's done it again and guess what?....On Thursday I have my first dressage lesson on her. That's my girl Shadow! (Artic Norma Jean).

The Heartbreak of OLWS

Before anyone accuses me of preaching to the converted I would like everyone to take a refresher course on the genetics of OLWS (Overo Lethal White Syndrome).

Why? Because as the current Genetics Portfolio holder I have the heartbreaking job of consoling members with the devastating experience of the birth of a lethal white foal, often as their first foaling experience. Whilst I am dedicated to helping these members, it is an unnecessary task and happening far too often.

Most of these people are new to the PHAA and are unfamiliar with paint genetics, it is up to all members to responsibly educate and support these new people.

Understandably the first reaction of the heartbroken first time breeder is to demand the eradication of all "diseased OLWS carriers". Those of us who are informed know that OLWS is just an unfortunate name given to a gene. Just like the genes that provide blue eyes or blond hair in humans, this gene provides the white patches so prized in our Paint horses. One copy of the gene on its own is not a problem or a disease even though the name implies that it is. Unfortunately, as these people have experienced, two copies of the gene produces an unviable foal. The answer is not to eliminate or stamp out the gene, because you would be eliminating the paint horse, but to make educated breeding choices.

The PHAA promotes the testing for the OLWS gene and recommends avoiding OLWS to OLWS matings.

Breeding programs specializing in overo have particular challenges compared with programs for other white patterns such as tobiano. Not only is there the possibility of producing a solid dark foal without the overo pattern but there is also the risk of producing an all-white foal that dies of complications from intestinal tract abnormalities (ileocolonic aganglionosis).

The gene is associated with horses characterized as "frame-overos". The temptation to breed overo horses to horses with the other white patterns to increase the chances of a coloured foal is not without risk however. Tobianos, sabinos, solid coloured offspring of overos and even Quarter Horses can carry the OLWS gene without expressing its visually. The only way to know if a horse doesn't carry the gene is to test for it. If a tobiano has an overo parent there is a 50% chance that it carries the gene and is in fact a tobero. The same goes for sabinos, splashed whites and solids.

Using the letter "O" to symbolize the DNA sequence of the lethal white (LW) overo gene and "N" for the sequence of the non-overo, then the lethal white foals can be symbolized as OO, their overo parents as NO and non-overos as NN.

Breeding predictions between LW overos (NO x NO):

	N	0
N	25% NN solid	25% NO overo
0	25% NO overo	25% OO lethal

Breeding predictions between LW overo and solid (NO x NN): No possibility of lethal white foals.

OLWS in its homozygous form is a terminal defect that results in unviable foals. Lethal White foals have blue or greyish eyes (unlike albinos who would have pink eyes) and in general have no skin pigmentation, although in some cases, foals can have some dark coloration here and there on the body.

The foals at first may appear normal except for their unusual colouring. They're usually perfectly conformed and stunningly beautiful. The foals stand, nurse and start playing, like any normal foal. However they don't usually have a bowel movement after they nurse or when you give them an enema. There have been cases of Lethal White foals passing the meconium, but they never get to the stage of passing the first milk stool. Signs of colic or intestinal cramping generally begin, from one hour to twelve hours following birth, due to this inability to pass faeces. The Lethal White foal has an underdeveloped intestine, in most cases; the intestine simply stops short of the anal opening so the food cannot pass all the way through the foal's digestive system. This is caused by a failure of the embryonic cells that form nerves in the gastrointestinal system; attempts to surgically bypass the problem have, to date, been unsuccessful. Depending upon the severity of the cramping and intestinal twisting, it can take several days for the foals to die on their own if no one takes pity on them and has them euthanized.

What can you do to help?

When you are selling a horse or stallion service to a new member, give an overview of the coat patterns and encourage them to access either the PHAA website or contact the office for printed materials.

If you get that desperate call at 3am in the morning, these are some of the questions I have been asked and the corresponding answers:

Q: "I think I have a lethal white foal, what symptoms should I be looking for?"

A: Lethal white foals just can't seem to get comfortable for very long. They toss and turn, consistently showing signs of distress, and get up and down repeatedly. Normal foals suckle, play and then sleep, with the play periods increasing as the days pass and they get stronger. It is not normal for a foal to roll repeatedly. It's not normal for a foal's rib cage musculature to cramp or for them to bite at their sides. It's not normal for them to butt their mother underneath repeatedly if they've already suckled or to switch and twitch their tails all the time (unless they're being bitten by flies) or to suck the tail tight against their buttocks. These are signs of stress and A twist can develop in horse pain. intestines from repeated rolling. It doesn't matter whether your foal is a lethal white or a normal coloured baby, this is a warning sign of possible trouble and you should call a veterinarian immediately. It's this repetitive rolling that goes on and on that is indicative of a problem, or repeated cramping along their rib cage.

Q: "My veterinarian has never heard of OLWS, what information can I give them"?

A: Refer them to the University of California, Davis or the APHA websites but I will also be updating the PHAA one.

Q: "My OLWS N/N mare has given me an all white foal, are her test results incorrect?"

Viable whites are usually a combination of equine white spotting patterns. Scientists believe such horses are white because they have two white spotting patterns that overlap. One of the genes may carry the overo lethal white characteristic, but the other gene carries another white pattern. It is possible for a horse to carry all 4 (tobiano, frame overo, sabino and splashed white) white spotting patterns.

In all cases I would advise people to call their veterinarian, however to defer making any decisions on euthanasia until the foal exhibited lethal white symptoms.


