#### THE PAINT HORSE ASSOCIATION OF AUSTRALIA • February - March 2007 •

You may have phoned the office and heard an unfamiliar voice on the line say 'Welcome to the Paint Horse Association this is Donna' Donna Bourke joined our PHAA office team in November last year and has been doing a fantastic job, Donna is eager to learn all about the PHAA and its members so please be patient when she needs a little assistance with those tricky questions

#### CHANGES TO DNA RECORDING PROCEDURE

We now have a more simplified way of recording Genetictesting results. When requesting a Genetic testing kit, you are no longer required to submit photos of your horse or return the registration certificate to the office.

Once the results have been processed by the laboratory and returned to the office the genetic result will be recorded on the horses file and a letter explaining the results will be sent directly to the owner. This means that genetic results are processed in a more timely fashion, and reduces the paperwork to and from owner and office.

We are not automatically noting Registration Certificates with the Case Number / Testing result, however, should you wish to have the results recorded on the horses Certificate of Registration, you can forward two recent photographs and the current Certificate of Registration with the Re-issue fee of \$35- to the office.



Because the skin of grey horses tends to have more melanin in it than that of other horses, grey horses can be more prone to developing melanomas, or small tumours on the skin.

Though they are rarely fatal, melanomas can be unsightly and can cause chafing, if they interfere with tack. Melanomas do not usually occur in younger horses. They can often be found under the dock of the tail, around the genital area, near the ears and eyes and in the jugular area. Most melanomas do not cause the animal any pain, and they don't often metastasise, as melanomas can do in humans. Thus, melanomas may not cause a problem to the horse during its normal life span.

Surgery and laser treatment can be used to remove melanomas, but veterinarians do not always recommend this course of action. As with any equine health issue, you should consult your veterinarian as to what, if anything, should be done in each particular case.


Dear Paint Horse Association, I am writing to advise the National and State Paints that I have sold my business "Coffee & Tea Cafe".



Thinking of travelling overseas and bringing back a saddle? Before you do, check with Australian Customs as the requirements have recently changed. Make sure you obtain a manufacturers declaration stating the materials used in the saddle internal and external. Failure to do so could result in the saddle being x-rayed or possibly opened to check the internal parts for items such as horse hair padding. No-one wants their brand new saddle to be unstitched!

When returning to Australia, always ensure that your foot wear has been properly cleaned if you have been on a farm or ranch. As tedious as this seems, our Quarantine laws are very strict to benefit all of us. We are fortunate to have very few of the contagious diseases that can be found in other countries around the world, thanks to our strict quarantine laws. YOUTH WORLD GAMES - You will have read in our past Journals the exciting news about our Australian Youth Teams over the last 6 years. The Youth World Games are held every second year during the APHA Paint World Show in Texas USA. 





## **VIVA PAINT VEGAS!**

APHA is not to be left out of the excitement. December 2006 saw the first "Paint Vegas" Paint Horse Show and Gift Show, held in the South Point Casino on the south end of "The Strip", Las Vegas Boulevard. In true Vegas tradition, money was the name of the game at this show – no points but plenty of money. Over half a million dollars was paid out in prize money over the duration of the show – some winners taking home \$25,000. Aside from the thousands of dollars, Paint Vegas Champions took home something extra special. Well known equine artist Marita McMillan designed an exclusive Paint Vegas trophy that was as unique as the competition whose winners it honoured. These beautiful awards featured three sculptured Paint Horse heads and a glass plaque.

A new concept was introduced at the inaugural Paint Vegas Show – Slot Classes, being limited entry events in which contestants reserved their space well in advance. Slot owners in this year's Paint Vegas purchased their chance at the big money in March, paying \$1500- per slot in the Longe-Line and \$2500- per slot in the other four Slot Classes. Horses and exhibitors for the classes were named in September. The payouts for the slot classes were as follows – Yearling Longe-Line \$43,500-Maiden Yearling Mares \$75,000-Maiden Yearling Stallions & Geldings \$67,500-4 Year Old & Under Novice Horse Western Pleasure \$57,500-4 Year Old & Under Novice Horse Hunter Under Saddle \$45,000-

Horses in the Maiden Halter classes can not have earned any recorded points or money, the Novice Performance horses can not have earned a World or Reserve World Championship title, more than 25 total points or more than \$1000- in NSBA earnings. Exhibitors in all of the classes have limited winnings on their records.

This combination of novice horses and exhibitors made for exciting competition, which, when considering the high stakes, turned the Slot Classes into very thrilling events at Paint Vegas.

Paint Vegas was held in the glorious South Point Casino complex – a Casino with luxurious accommodation, plenty

of restaurants, gift store, new fully enclosed, climate controlled arena as well as climate controlled, secure stabling – all under the one roof. You do not need to leave the building for anything. Within the arena complex APHA hosted a gift show with 36 traders including well known companies such as Barnmaster, Gist Silversmiths, KC Montgomery Photographics, New Holland, Woods Western and of course an APHA Gift Store.

The Show opened at 8am each day and concluded around 5pm leaving plenty of time for visitors and competitors to have a ton of fun in Vegas. The Show opened on Tuesday December 5th with Tie-Down Roping first up – and the first spectator through the door was an Australian! Go Kevin Mills!!

The best of the best in bronc riding, bull riding, roping & barrels as well as untold entertainment through out the show and live outdoor concerts. Christmas trade

fairs are held in dozens of the Casinos – including Cowboy Christmas and Sams Town Western Trade Show with over 500 traders represented. You could go crazy with your shopping in this town.

Breed associations have co-opted the term for registration purposes, but graving is actually an aging process that eliminates a horse's normal coat color.



When a person's hair starts to turn grey, we realise they are getting older. Yet, when we think of grey in horses, we often simply see colour - he's sorrel, bay or grey.

But when it comes to greying, horses aren't that different from us. People are born with blond, brown, black or red hair, and, at different rates for each of us, our hair gradually loses its colour and becomes gray, perhaps even white. In humans, gray isn't a colour, and this is a principle we should also apply to horses.

"There's the misconception that gray is a colour, and it isn't," said Dr. Bonnie B. Beaver. "Grey is a white pattern imposed on a base colour." A veterinarian and specialist in animal behaviour at Texas A&M University, as well as a breeder of Palominos, Beaver co-authored the book Horse Colour with Dr. D. Phillip Sponenberg, professor of pathology and genetics at the Virginia-Maryland Regional College of Veterinary Medicine. It's easy to label a horse a particular colour based on what we see. That's how breed associations initially began registering colours, before equine genetic research revealed that a gene separate from body colour controls grey. "Grey is dominant," said Sponenberg, who has also written the book Equine Colour Genetics. "So grey horses should have a grey parent." Horses are born with a particular body colour, and if they inherit the dominant grey gene from their sire or dam, they will eventually lighten to grey. Some become grey at a very young age, while others take years to grey out. "I don't know of any way to predict the speed with which a horse will go grey," said Sponenberg. "It does differ somewhat breed to breed, implying that genetics plays a role." Greving can dramatically change a horse's look as it ages. Five-time World Champion HBF Iron Man, for example, looked much darker when he was winning at the World Show as a 3- year-old in 1999, than he does today.

"HBF Iron Man was bay when he was foaled," said Celeste Fender, who co-owns the stallion with Robin De-grafe and who raised him from a colt. "He had a little rim of grey around his eye. His barn name when he was young was "Rusty" because he was a rusty colour.



A horse of a different age - not color. As is the case with all horses that go gray, 10-year-old HBF Iron Man has appeared to develop more white hair each year of his life. In truth, the stallion's bay hair has simply lost its color

"Yet, by the time HBF Iron Man was winning his first world championship at age 3, he was a dark gray. Today, the now-10year-old stallion is a much lighter gray, with only the black points of his original colour left on his legs and the tips of his ears.

#### GREY IN PAINTS:

Because the Paint breed developed from the amount of white that occurson a horse's body, greying can be a challenge for Paint breeders and owners. As the grey lightens a horse's original body coat colour, it becomes harder to distinguish between the colour and the white areas of a horse's body. If a horse is going to grey, it's important to register the animal early, especially if it has minimal white.

"When people submit their registrations early in the foal's life, deter-mining eligibility isn't difficult," said Cindy Grier, manager of APHA's reg-60 istration department. "It's when they wait until the horse has greyed that determining eligibility can be more difficult. The contrast between a true white marking and a grey coat colour can sometimes be difficult to differentiate in photographs." In most horses, the skin retains the original body colour when the horse greys, whereas white patches have no pigment at the skin level. Because of that, one trick that works to show the contrast between gray and white is hosing down the horse with water. "Often, a trusty garden hose will help us 'see' the horse's original body pattern," Grier said. Greys make up only 1.6 percent of the total number of Paints registered, according to Grier. But she added that the number should probably be higher because it doesn't include horses that were originally registered as their base colour without the registration being updated when they greyed. Paint breeders are more likely to breed for typical Paint colour patterns, such as tobiano and overo, or performance traits, which may be another reason for the small amount of grey in the breed.

By contrast, breeds such as the Lipizzaner and the Percheron are almost all grey, while gray is also very common in breeds like the Arabian. continued to page 18

#### **GREY GENES:**

Because the grey gene is dominant, it is relatively easy to get a grey horse. While the study of genes is by no means complete, we do know that genes occur in pairs, with each parent giving one of the pair to its offspring. We can designate the gene for grey as "G" and the gene for nongrey as "g" to indicate that gray will dominate over non-grey. In other words, if a horse receives a "G" from one parent and a "g" from the other, it will grey because the "G" is dominant and the "g" is recessive. When a horse receives both a dominant and recessive gene, it is heterozygous for the trait it has one of each. If the horse receives two dominant genes (greying would be indicated by "GG"), then it is homozygous dominant, whereas if it receives two recessive genes ("gg"), then it is homozygous recessive.

If a horse is a homozygous grey (GG), all of its offspring will be grey. If it is homozygous recessive for the trait (gg), then it will not be grey and will not be able to pass grey on to its foals. However, such a horse could get a grey foal if bred to a horse with a dominant grey gene (GG or Gg). Most grey horses are heterozygous gray (Gg). That means that they can contribute either a dominant or recessive gene for the trait. Theoretically, two heterozygous grey horses would produce 25 percent homozygous greys, 50 percent heterozygous greys, and 25 percent non-greys (homozygous recessive for grey). Visually, that would mean 75 percent grey horses. Of course, just like a coin flip would theoretically produce 50 percent heads and 50 percent tails, but doesn't, breeders won't get those exact percentages either.

Or, as Beaver added with a laugh, "We all know that if you breed for a particular colour, you won't get it." Plus, a grey stallion's book won't consist entirely of grey mares. Likewise, a grey mare will probably not be bred to a grey stallion every year. Instead, grey horses are usually bred to horses of a variety of colours. All of the non greys they are bred to will be homozygous recessive for grey. When a heterozygous grey is bred to a homozygous recessive for grey, the offspring should be half grey and half non-grey. Beaver said that she is not aware of a genetic test to determine whether a grey horse is homozygous or heterozygous.

If a horse produces even one non-grey, then it is heterozygous for grey. The opposite is not necessarily true, however, because no matter how many foals a horse produces, chance instead of genetics could make them all grey. HBF Iron Man is a good example of how a heterozygous grey stallion typically reproduces. From his first 75 foals, the stallion has sired 36 grays from books that include mares of many colours.

When crossed three times with the sorrel overo mare Miss Sonny Bonanza, HBF Iron Man has sired three grey foals, whereas when crossed four times with the chestnut overo mare HBF Flirt N Fancy, he has sired two greys, a bay and a chestnut. And when bred twice to the sorrel mare Eagley Jazzed, he has sired a bay and a chestnut. HBF Iron Man and the grey mare Eternally Matched have produced two greys, while he and the grey mare Wicks Park have produced one buck-skin. Fender said that though her bloodlines reflect the performance traits she is looking for, she was hoping HBF Iron Man would be grey. Likewise, breeders who take their mares to the stallion are also hoping that they will get a grey foal along with the stallion's performance ability. "They consider grey a bonus," Fender said.

#### **DETERMINING COLOUR:**

Even though grey isn't genetically a colour, when it comes to registering horses, it is considered a colour. APHA, as do most other major breed associations, labels grey a colour for registration purposes, and grey trumps all the others. In other words, if you have a sorrel, bay or black horse that will eventually turn grey, it should be registered grey.

## GREY isn't a "color." - continued from page 18...

It's still helpful to know the base colour of a grey horse, especially since base coat colour and grey are controlled by two different genes. In fact, in Equine Colour Genetics, Sponenberg writes that horses get their colour from 11 genetically independent processes. These include genes that cause white patterns in Paints, as well as genes that dilute such basic colours as bay and chestnut/sorrel into colours such as buckskin, palomino, cremello and perlino.

Because grey acts on the base coat as the horse ages, it is sometimes difficult to know the original base coat colour of an adult horse.

"Grey doesn't tell me anything," said Beaver, who in breeding Palominos is very concerned with base coat colour. "If you don't know a grey horse when it is young, you may not be able to know its base colour.

" Beaver cites the example of a grey horse that has black points on his legs, mane, tail and ears. "People assume that the horse was originally black," she said. "But he could have been bay, grullo or buck-skin. These horses are not going to breed like a black horse. They are going to breed what the base coat was." Enter the "colour" roan to confuse things even further. Like grey, roan isn't genetically a colour. However, instead of introducing white hairs as a horse ages, like grey does, roan sprinkles white hairs among the horse's base coat colour from birth, and the amount of white does not change with age. Also, the roaning pattern may not be consistent throughout the horse's body. It may concentrate in such places as the hindquarters, girth, barrel and tail dock. It is also possible for a horse to be a grey roan.

APHA and the American Quarter Horse Association distinguish between grey and roan. The two organizations even have different colours of roan. APHA allows owners to register blue, red and bay roans. Yet, The Jockey Club, which registers Thoroughbreds, has combined grey and roan into one colour classification to reduce the number of corrected registration certificates. The Jockey Club acknowledges that the two colours differ genetically, but its combination of the two can introduce confusion when a Thoroughbred becomes part of a Paint or Quarter Horse pedigree.

HBF Iron Man received his grey gene from his dam, the Thoroughbred mare Strawberry Lane. The Jockey Club had registered her as a roan, an incorrect designation that can be discovered by looking at her pedigree and produce record. Strawberry Lane traces back through her sire to the grey Thoroughbred champion Native Dancer and through her "roan" dam to her grey second dam, LouSepha. Strawberry Lane not only produced the obviously gray HBF Iron Man, but also the 1993 Thoroughbred filly Cranberry, who was registered as a "grey/roan.

#### **"REGISTRATION DIFFICULTIES:**

Even though APHA offers many different categories of colour, people can still have trouble properly identifying their horse at registration time. Roans may not have enough of the roaning pattern for easy identification, while grey will often not show up before a horse needs to be registered. "People who have raised a lot of grey horses know what to look for," Beaver said. "A foal who will eventually turn grey may have a dustier colour around their face. But if you're not used to it, you won't pick it up." APHA's Grier agreed with Beaver. She said that an ultimately grey horse that as a foal looks sorrel or bay, for example, will often have an unusual hue compared to a non-grey foal of the same base colour.

Fender noted that while she could tell that HBF Iron Man would grwy as he got older, the stallion's first foal, HBF Drop Your Irons, fooled them. "Drop Your Irons was a bright cherry red when he was born," Fender said. "He had no grey around his eye or anywhere."

Registration photographs can often help in determining whether a horse should be registered grwy. The APHA registration department can raise the question with an owner if a foal's photos indicate that it may eventually turn grey.

Parentage also provides a clue because genetically a grey horse must have at least one grey parent. If it doesn't, then usually a mistake occurred when the parent was registered. "We see obviously greying foals that do not have a grey parent, but grey is apparent in the pedigree further back," Grier said. "The sire or dam obviously was registered as its base colour and never updated." If that happens, APHA contacts the owner of the parent whose pedigree suggests that's where the gray came from, requesting current photos and the original registration certificate.

Most of the time, the parent is confirmed grey and its information is updated. However, if that cannot be confirmed or the photos of the parent show it not to be grey, then APHA will require parentage verification. While it may be tempting with a possibly grey foal to wait on registration, that may not be convenient for those who want to show a foal early. Grier also advised registering early so that a Paint's white areas show up their best, noting that it is easy to amend a registration certificate later. "All a member needs to do is return the original certificate, current photographs of the horse and a note or completed correction form requesting the change," Grier said. "Colour changes are done at no charge to APHA members."

If a horse's base coat colour is one of the lighter, diluted colours, such as palomino or cremello, grey can be especially difficult to determine. "A cremello, for example, could go grey," said Sponenberg, "but would still end up being a pale, pink skinned, blue eyed horse."

Mapping the grey gene and developing a test for it may eventually solve these registration problems. Work is being done to map more of the equine genome, and it has been reported that a team of researchers in Sweden is working on the grey gene. Until then, grey will continue to draw primary attention through its dramatic "colour."

"A lot of people like grey horses," Fender said. "They really stand out in the ring."  ${\ensuremath{ \bullet}}$

## **GREY HORSE Syndrome**

#### PERSPECTIVE TWO - (AS DISCUSSED FROM PREVIOUS ARTICLE)...

Does any other animal go grey like a horse goes grey? There are animals that are grey in colour but they are born grey, there are shades of grey and agouti among cats, dogs, rabbits, goats, there are "blue" cows, there are even other colours in the horse that appear grey, such as blue roan, and roan associated with Appaloosa colouring. People lose their hair colour from middle to advanced age. But unique among animals, horses "go grey".

A grey horse is can be born any colour, and the greying of the coat begins some time after birth and progresses. Very aged grey horses are white, with or without a "fleabitten" effect. Breeders can usually identify a foal that will turn grey by the presence of grey hairs around the eyes. Only foals that have at least one grey parent can go grey, but conversely a foal with 2 grey parents may remain non-grey, even in breeds with a high percentage of homozygous greys such as the Lipizzanner.

A grey horse has the usual complement of genes for colour and/or pattern inherited from both parents, but geneticists have long regarded the tendency to "grey out" as a factor that acts in addition to the genotype for coat colour. The inheritance pattern for grey follows Mendelian rules. It can be homozygous or heterozygous, and it is dominant in that if the animal carries one gene for the factor, the horse will appear grey. A grey horse must have at least one grey parent, ie the factor cannot be carried recessively. I believe that the "factor" that makes a horse go grey is in fact an inheritable dominant mutation which affects the skin and hair of the grey horse, and which in its full expression is "grey horse melanoma".

Gower (1999, p. 60) states the following: "Throughout the life of a grey, pigment is removed from the hair and



redeposited in the gut or skin, and this is thought to be responsible for...the slow-growing deposits of pigment loosely termed 'melanoma'.

Fintl & Dixon (2001) refer to a 1972 survey by Stannard which indicated that "more than 80% of grey horses over 15 years old were affected with such [melanotic] growths".

In the same article, Yager et al (1993) is quoted as suggesting that all grey horses would eventually develop such lesions if they lived long enough.

Drs Sutton and Coleman from Uni. Qld. studied 97 grey horses and 16 coloured horses at a pet food abattoir, and

"found that all grey horses aged greater than [an estimated] 15 years had evidence of melanoma lesions." Also, they stated that though a number of horses showed no signs of lesions before death, tumours were found post-mortem. They concluded that "all grey horses of either sex are likely to develop melanotic tumours given time." (Sutton & Coleman, 1997).

Melanoma in grey horses has been known for centuries. Often the presence of small, slow-growing tumours does not affect the usefulness or general health of a grey horse, but in other cases the tumours are larger, more numerous, they progress more rapidly and they interfere with the horse's comfort or well-being. Tumours often present initially on the dock or around the anus, and sometimes they affect the parotid region where they can interfere with the jugular, the windpipe, or the movement of the jaw when eating.

Various treatments have been used with limited success, such as surgical excision, cryotherapy, chemotherapy and immunotherapy (Fintl et al 2001). Treatment with cimetidine and other H2 antagonists (Goetz and Long, 1993) was regarded as "beneficial in the management of melanomas in some horses."

A question that occurs is, do solid-coloured horses ever develop so-called 'grey-horse melanoma'? They certainly develop other types of cancer, but is this particular type of equine cancer only found in greys?

It is amazing that all the evidence has been right in front of horse breeders for centuries, but it seems no-one has looked critically at the process of greying in the horse for what it is a pathology.

Perhaps we are seeing more of these grey horse melanomas because horses used for recreational purposes are working into their twenties, or are being kept as retired companions where once they would have been put down when their useful years were over.

What are the implications for grey horses? Should you buy a grey?

Research suggests that although all grey horses will eventually show symptoms of melanoma, in a percentage of cases it will have no significant effect on their health or ability to be worked.

Many greys do not exhibit symptoms of the disease until they are quite aged . (Foley et al (1991) suggest that "melanomas in young horses...appear to show more variation in location and also in coat colour of affected animals.") Some grey horses are asymptomatic into advanced old age, though tumours may be found post-mortem.

Depending on the size, location and nature of the tumours, even a horse with melanoma can live for many years after showing symptoms. The tumours are usually "benign", though in some cases they may metastasise (Yager et al 1993).

Unless tumours interfere with other organs, they do not appear to cause the animal pain.

I find any event can be a favourite if you have the right attitude and the right company around you and as corny as it sounds Paints have great people and great events so just about everything we get involved in turns out to be special for one reason or another. In conclusion, rather than grey horses being "prone" to equine melanoma, it is more accurate to say that a syndrome exists which in its early expression changes the coat colour to grey.

In some individuals the disease then progresses and primary tumours develop usually on the dock or around the anogenital area.

In a further percentage of grey horses the tumours become more widespread and/or occur around the head and neck.

In cases where tumours of the parotid region occur and restrict eating or breathing, or in cases where anogenital tumours complicate elimination, the animal may have to be put down.

Basically, if you purchase a grey horse, there is a probability that at some stage in its life it will develop some symptoms of melanoma. It would be possible to eradicate grey horse melanoma by eliminating greys from all breeding programs, but this would be unrealistic, particularly since in a large percentage of cases the syndrome has no ill effect on the animal - there is evidence to suggest that in some populations, individuals seem more resistant to the development of tumours.

Owners of grey horses should however be aware that grey horse melanoma is the result of a genetic mutation rather than a "disease" in the normally understood sense of the term, and that as such there are unlikely to be effective "cures" developed.

Kerry Morgan, B.A. Dip Ed. January 2007 The paper I wrote in 2003 put forward a theory that grey coat colouration in horses was a mutation and that "grey horse melanoma" was part and parcel of the syndrome.

If you turn the question around and instead of asking "why do so many grey horses get melanoma?", you ask "why are almost all horses with melanoma grey?", you can approach the problem from a different perspective.

Up till now, no model could satisfactorily answer the following questions -

If melanoma is benign, how does a horse end up with numerous lesions which arise independently?

Why is surgery ineffective?

How does Cimetidine suppress or slow the formation of tumours? Why do greys "lose" the colour pigment from their hair? Is it in fact a "normal" process? Why does it not occur in any other species? What substance makes up the tumours?

Why is the ratio of horses that develop tumours variable with breed, and why are tumours apparently less prevalent in older breeds with more grey horses? Is there an adaptation working? What, if anything, "switches on" the process? Could it be "switched off"?

Can it be prevented or delayed? How?

Do all greys descend from one individual? When? And where? A study undertaken at the University of Uppsala in Sweden in 2005, with results published by Pielberg et al as Comparative linkage mapping of the Grey coat colour gene in horses, identifies the gene responsible for grey colouring in horses and states that the research suggests "that the grey phenotype is caused by a mutation in a novel gene."

Research is now being undertaken in equine genetics to determine where and when this mutation occurred. This is being done partly by mathematical models, and partly by research into art and literature, examining how far back we can find representations of white or grey horses, or mention of them. Most people will recall the well-known Biblical quote: And I saw, and behold a white horse: and he that sat on him had a bow; and a crown was given unto him: and he went forth conquering, and to conquer. This has been thought to perhaps represent the image of the feared Parthian mounted archer on his white horse. Certainly white and grey horses existed during the time of the Egyptian dynasties - the evidence so far gathered is pointing to the mutation that causes grey having occurred many thousands of years ago, probably in the Middle East, and therefore probably in the ancestors of the Arabian. It will be fascinating when the puzzle is finally solved. "Please be aware also that the paper explores a theory, and that although the theory offers what I believe is the best explanation for the apparent link between grey colour in horses, and the specific "grey horse" form of equine melanoma, research still continues into the syndrome.

Since I wrote my paper, a gene mapping study done at the University of Uppsala by Pielberg et al (2005 - ref below) has indicated that the greying mechanism in horses is indeed a unique mutation.

It may also be of interest to readers to know that I have recently purchased a 4yo QH gelding - and he is grey."

• FAVOURITE TIME OF THE YEAR TO RIDE: Anytime. Hot or cold.





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
