The new ABRI data system continues to be installed in the office and is being held up with the necessary corrections to data taking far longer to implement than was originally thought.While all the data has been transferred, minor errors that previously did not show in the old system now require amending before full implementa-



tion can occur. To give you some indication, a single error can require up to several hundred input amendments, which the staff need to do in addition to their normal tasks in supporting the membership. We are looking at ways to hopefully speed this up, but when it is completed it will provide a very high quality data system.

It was interesting to note some of comments on Facebook re the investigation into the running of a joint National Show in conjunction with the Appaloosa Association. At present it is an idea that is being investigated and it will be worked through to see if it is feasible. It has at its core the fact that each Association could save in excess of \$20,000 if it were to come to fruition and this is 20% of the current cost of running the show at Tamworth. This is not small change and any Board must investigate this type of option or be derelict in their responsibilities. Yes it might be an inconvenience to some, but the board will continue to look at the whole picture when making decisions that affect the PHAA and its membership. As I have always said, debate is healthy.

In finishing up I would encourage everyone to take note of the new way in which we are running the YISC this year. It is hoped that the new format will deliver a better outcome for the Youth.

The Nervous Horse

Horses can become quite nervous before a show. They can anticipate 'bad things' and lo and behold 'bad things' happen. After being on the mix for a week or so you can slowly begin to re-introduce your horse to the situation that triggers the nervousness, a little at a time so try just leading him around shows for a while and then think about riding.



Most horses only require 1-2 courses of this mix with perhaps a repeat 12 months down the track. At home include some chamomile tea in the horse's feed. This is an excellent calmer for horses that are quite gut reactive in their nervousness, e.g. loose manure, colicky, etc. Add 4-6 teabags or 3-4 dessertspoons of the dried flowers to 1 litre of boiling water. Allow to cool and use half for the morning feed and half for the evening feed. This can be given as an ongoing supplement and is also very good for the coat.

You could also include some brewers yeast in the feed that is an excellent source of B vitamins.

It is also a good idea to have a qualified equine massage therapist or chiropractor to check out the horse structurally to make sure all is in balance and to also have your saddle fit checked I have a four part program that works to strengthen the nervous system itself:

- 1. The Nervous System Rehabilitation formulation that nourishes and strengthens the nervous system, allowing you to break into habit patterns and essentially supports re-training. This is given over a course of 3 months or more during which time you introduce your horse to all sorts of new experiences and include exposures to the situations it has problems with randomly throughout the re-training period. This will break into habits and resolve them.
- 2. The Travel Trauma Mix that contains rescue remedy more comprehensive in that it will assist them to calm down quickly and safely without allowing a situation to spiral out of control and into a stress induced colic or worse. This is really the one to carry for emergencies and is given before, during and after a trip for a horse which reacts badly. The former is to use to get rid of the problem and is given daily as a course.
- **3.** For the actual show day we have a Nervous Episodes Mix, that is begun 48 hours prior to the event. This would be run in conjunction with the nervous rehabilitation for your horses.
- 4. There is also a homeopathic remedy called Bach Flower-Rescue Remedy. It is available in health food stores and even some chemists. It's great for shock, fright, panic and such and is a great addition to the first aid cupboard for humansand animals. It will stop the panic spiral that you get into and can be used before exams, when you have had an accident, argument or fright. Use a couple of drops in your mouth or for animals just pull out the lower lip and put on a few drops or a squirt. It will work instantly and last about 20-30 minutes so. In times of trauma it can be given frequently for as long as required. In addition you can also add some Chamomile tea to the feed. 2 dessert spoons of Chamomile flowers to 1 litre of boiling water. 1/2 in the morning feed the rest at night each day. Chamomile is a great calmer and will also soothe the gut if stressed.


10. Most memorable moment



STARTING OUT

Breeding to Have Fun With Halter Horses

If you are keen on breeding your own horses there are lots of things to consider. You need to be realistic about your expectations and what it takes to achieve your goal. Be aware, just because you are breeding your mare to a highly credentialed stallion that the stallion is not a miracle worker. From the 20 years of breeding experience I mostly get a copy of the mare with some slight changes from the stallion. There are occasions when you get an extraordinary result, but for you to get the result you desire more often you should rely on the quality of the mare.

You need to be honest with yourself as to what level of success you expect for the money you are comfortable in spending to get your foal. Horse people are definitely passionate and passion is good driven in the right direction, but trying to have a balance is the key to providing a long term enjoyment out of horses.

Make sure you do your sums and understand additional costs like agistment, mare care, transport and collection of semen and vet fees. Often these additional fees can add up and without really understanding the cost before you start it can take the enjoyment out of breeding the foal. When entering into any breeding arrangement with the stallion owner, even if it is one of your friends, make sure you put the agreement in writing with a stallion breeding contract. It is far better to preserve your friendship and have a copy of what both parties expect in writing.

Breeding horses is not an exacting thing – you can breed four or five full brothers or sisters and I can guarantee you that they will all be slightly different.

train my eye. If you need some advice look to the people in the industry that have consistently been breeding and achieving results at the level you would like to achieve yourself.

Selection of the Stallion

I am always looking to improve where I can. It does not necessarily mean when you breed two world champions together that you will get a world champion. When you can evaluate your mare and match the mare to the stallion, don't breed horses together with the same conformational weakness — analytically you are likely to get the same fault.

Whilst breeding as we understand it is not exacting, with some genetics working well with others, I am always looking analytically towards the conformation of breeding horses being matched. Temperament is important, as well as being show horses they need to be a companion animal. The bond you form with your horse will give you the confidence to show and have more fun.

Breeding horses can be very rewarding and some success will encourage you to continue to breed. But remember to try and keep a balance in your life so you don't place yourself under financial pressure, which will take the enjoyment out of the whole involvement.

What to look for - no horse is perfect


I feel recently there has been a slight change in direction, which I believe to be good for the welfare of the halter horse — a horse that is balanced and fits together. Earlier times I believed the horses were extreme in some point of their

conformation e.g. big hipped with heavy muscling, also there is a trend with horses in America to have been excessively straight hocked with no angle. But now a horse that is balanced and correct almost all of the time will be put up.

There has been a move with the new Association called World Conformation Horse Association that is based in America and has a breed standard of excellence, with balanced and correct horses being one of their objectives. Any push in this direction will take some time and hopefully trickle through to Australia. This will give the direction of the future standard of excellence of western horses, which is good for the horse and the industry.

To develop an eye for a horse takes years and for myself it is an ongoing process of looking at horses that are consistently placing in the show arena to

and still managed to compete at Paint Week with some outstanding results. The competition in these Youth classes is second to none and the results were shared amongst all competing.



FOALING

-WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW -

Breeding from your mare is both an exciting and anxious time. It is important that you are able to recognise the start of foaling (labour) and its different stages. You can then enjoy the experience, reassured that you know what to do if problems occur. Difficult foaling is not common, but you need to be able to act quickly if the mare is not making progress.

How long is pregnancy?

In horses the average pregnancy (gestation period) is 342 days (approximately 11 months), but can range between 321 and 365 days. In other words normal foals can be born up to three weeks late. In contrast to humans, it is rarely necessary for mares to be induced because they are overdue – you will just have to be patient!

How can I prepare for birth? Your mare

During pregnancy your mare will require special attention. Ensure that her feet are trimmed regularly and do not allow her to become overweight. Regular paddock exercise in late pregnancy is essential. For the last three months she will need to be fed a purpose made stud-mix or stud cubes, which, along with good hay or grass, will provide all the nutrients, she needs. Resist the temptation to feed a 'home mixed' diet.

We strongly recommend that all pregnant mares be vaccinated against Equine Herpesvirus (EHV or virus abortion) at 5, 7 and 9 months. It is good practice for your mare to have booster vaccinations against 'flu and tetanus' one month before foaling. This ensures her first milk (colostrum) contains high levels of antibodies, which will provide instant protection for the foal against these diseases in the first few weeks of life. It is extremely important that the foal receives the colostrum. Therefore if milk is seen dripping from the udder before foaling, collect it in a clean container and freeze it. This will then need to be given to the foal by bottle or stomach tube in the first six hours after birth.

Some mares will have had their vulva stitched after covering to prevent infection of the uterus during pregnancy. It will be necessary for us to open the vulva surgically at least two weeks before the anticipated foaling date. This is a simple procedure done under a local anaesthetic.

Mares that have never foaled before should be accustomed to having their udder and teats handled by gently stroking them every day for the last few weeks.

Where to foal

Move your mare to the foaling premises at least six weeks before she is due to foal. Provide a clean safe environment, preferably a large loose box bedded with clean straw. Alternatively, although less ideal as supervision is less easy, use a small clean grassy paddock. Make sure that the fencing is non-hazardous for mares and newborn foals, and that there are no ditches, ponds or wet areas.

Have a watch, pen and paper ready to accurately record the time of each stage of labour. This information is important in the, thankfully, rare event that veterinary assistance is needed later.

You will need to bandage your mare's tail with a clean bandage to keep the tail hairs out of the way.

How will I know when my mare is starting to foal?

There are important clues that can alert you to the approach of foaling. However some mares will only show a few of these signs and some will show none at all. The first signs can appear several days and even weeks before actual delivery.

- The udder begins to fill with milk up to 2-4 weeks before foaling, so watch for any signs of enlargement.
- Relaxation of the birth opening (vulva) and birth canal (pelvic canal/ligaments), making the mares tail head more pronounced and the vulval lips longer, can occur a few days before foaling.
- Enlargement of the teats occurs 4-6 days before foaling.
- A clear waxy secretion (waxing) on the teats can appear I-4 days before foaling and is usually a good sign of imminent birth.
 Occasionally dripping milk will be seen.
- Your mare may be nervous and restless, and show signs similar to mild colic.

Most mares foal at night or in the early hours of the morning, so be prepared for some sleepless nights!

Does a vet need to be present?

Most mares foal without assistance and it is not necessary for a vet to be present unless problems occur. Foaling is a rapid process and difficulties arise quickly. It is essential that you detect the signs of abnormality promptly. However do not interfere excessively during the early stages of labour - watch quietly from a distance.

If you have no prior experience of foaling, ask an experienced friend to help you, or if a maiden mare seriously consider sending your mare to a stud farm to foal. It is safe to transport mares in late pregnancy although they should be given at least 4-6 weeks to adjust to their new environment.

What happens during foaling?

Foaling is divided into three stages.

STAGE I - LABOUR BEGINS

Contractions of the uterus (womb) begin. The aim of these contractions is to move the foal into the birth canal, which opens ready for the foal to pass through. Signs you may observe are:

- Restlessness
- · Signs like colic e.g. looking at the flank, pawing the ground
- · Frequent passage of small quantities of faeces

This stage can last about an hour. Do not disturb the mare during this time. Have a few people as present as possible. Stage 1 ends with the 'breaking of the waters', which flow out of the vulva, and the appearance of a whitish portion of afterbirth protruding from the vulva. Note the time when the 'waters' break.

STAGE 2 - THE BIRTH OF THE FOAL

This stage is remarkably short, lasting about 30 minutes. If it takes longer let your vet know straight away.

The mare will lie down and have strong belly contractions that push the foal down the birth canal. The foal normally comes through the vulva in the following order:

- 1. Front feet first, one slightly in front of the other, hooves facing down
- 2. Then the nose, head, neck, shoulders etc.
- 3. The foal is usually delivered lying on its side. It lays still for a little while after expulsion, with the hind legs up to hock level still inside the vulva, and the umbilical cord still intact.
- 4. If the foal is not coming in this sequence let your vet know immediately.

Do not intervene when the foal is delivered unless there is something wrong (see below).

The foal will be covered by the birth membranes (amnion), which often break at the moment of delivery, and which the mare will lick and nibble off. This is important in the bonding process between the mare and foal and also stimulates the foal to breathe, stand and suck.

If the membrane is covering the foal's muzzle and the mare does not clean it away immediately, you must remove it and clear the foal's nostrils of any mucus so that it can breathe freely. Watch carefully for normal breathing.

The umbilical cord attaching the foal to the mare usually breaks when the foal struggles to its feet or the mare stands up. It is preferable to allow it to break naturally, so do not break it yourself or disturb the mare so that it breaks early. The umbilical stump (foal's navel) will need to be treated with an antiseptic several times during the first 24 hours of life to prevent infection. Ask your vet for an appropriate product to use.

STAGE 3 - THE AFTERBIRTH IS EXPELLED

This can last 1-2 hours, but usually occurs within one hour of foaling. The mare may be mildly colicky as she expels the afterbirth. If it has not been expelled within three hours contact your vet and tie up any membranes with string, which are hanging from the vulva, so that the mare does not tear them or step on them.

Keep the afterbirth in a bucket for the vet to inspect later, as it can often provide them with valuable information about the birth. If some of the afterbirth is retained within the mare this can lead to serious post-foaling problems such as womb infections (metritis) and laminitis.

What are the signs that something is wrong?

Foaling difficulties occur in only 4-6% of births. These can be life threatening to the mare and foal and can also prevent her having further successful pregnancies.

Signs to look for

• Prolonged stage 1 or particularly stage 2. If either of these stages is prolonged by even a short amount of time there is much less chance of having a healthy foal. If the mare is not

· Incorrect presentation of the foal.

How do I care for the newborn foal?

Remember that foaling is a natural process and try to intervene as little as possible. This is especially important with maiden (first foaling) or nervous mares. Give the mare and foal time to rest and establish a strong maternal bond. Disturb them as little as possible e.g. there is not need to dry the foal or handle it any way. If you must be with them do not put yourself between the mare and foal.

The foal should be standing within 1-2 hours of birth, and sucking with 1-3 hours. If the foal takes longer than this it may be a sign that something is wrong so please contact your vet.

The foal should urinate and pass its first droppings (meconium) during the first day. Sometimes the foal will strain a little to pass the meconium, but if it fails to do so it may need veterinary assistance to enable it to be passed.

It is recommend you contact your vet in the first day of life to arrange an examination of the foal to ensure it is healthy and that no deformities are present. The vet will usually give the foal an anti-tetanus injection at this time. At the same time they will usually check the mare to ensure her genital tract has suffered no ill effects from the birth process.

What follow-up care does my mare need?

Watch her carefully for any abnormal signs such as colic, lack of interest in or rejection of the foal, profuse bloody discharge from her vulva, inability or reluctance to stand, or loss of appetite.

Provide your mare with good quality hay, stud cubes or stud mix, and grass to encourage her milk production. Check her udder for signs of mastitis (heat, swelling, pain) or inadequate milk production.

The foal will suck at least four times per hour in the first week of life. Between bouts of sucking, it will sleep or explore its environment. Decreased frequency or cessation of sucking is an early warning of a sick foal and should be watched for.

IS JOUR HOUSE AT ITSER? " No, he's fine, he only has a white star"

If this is you then maybe it's time to think again.

It's hard to think of a school or workplace that would allow constant exposure to the sun without insisting on sunscreen and hats. The slip, slop, slap message has been embedded into our daily lives - but what about our beloved horses?

Owners of horses with "lots of bling" will no doubt be familiar with the scourge of sunburnt eyes, nose and lips, but a look at the frequency of sun related equine cancers shows this problem is more than skin deep.

Skin cancers are regularly seen in horse eyes and not just those that are lacking in pigment. So what can we do to help our equine friends?

There are quite a few that may have been prevented simply by the use of horse 'sunglasses and hat'. We often use a fly veil to protect from insects so why not be smart about the type of mask we use and double the benefits with a high UV rated shade?

When thinking about face 'shade', think about the colour and its not about fashion trends! It is a misconception that the lighter colours are better and therefore a white or grey coloured mask should be great. Wrong!!! It is great for a rug where reflection is a bonus, but the reflection when looking through light coloured mesh all day is very uncomfortable. Try it sometime.

Like our horses and breeding programs, the products and facilities to protect them have improved dramatically over recent years. This is especially important for those with white faces or those with large areas of fair skin. We often show at an indoor venue (although 90% of the day is usually spent outside) and we have some great rugs that protect the body and as a bonus, there are now a couple of small manufacturers making dedicated UV rated sun masks for the face.



It is a belief that the horse has evolved to live outside so they don't need all the UV protection and this is true to a point. The part that is forgotten is that we bred them to be pretty. We bred them to have all these lovely white face markings (and the more white the better) and we must take responsibility to care for them correctly. In the wild, natural attrition would not see most of these horses live a long life and therefore only the tough and healthy survive to breed on into their teens.

One of the other no no's is when we smother them with oils and other products to make them shine and then take them out to a show for the day. Within a couple of hours (or less) the are 'baked'. It is sad to see a three or four year old horse with flaking & scabbing skin above the eyes or on the sides of the mouth from sun damage and knowing what he or she has in store for the rest of their life. Having skin cancer treated is not only expensive, painful and unsightly, it is so often preventable if we start early.

Almost every human gets screened for some type of cancer but cancers of the inside of the body are rare in horses where cancers of the skin are fairly common. Most owners are diligent about checking their horse cuts and bumps while grooming. This should include checking the eyes for subtle changes and early indicators of problems. Squamous cell carcinoma (SCC), for instance, is something an owner might notice and is one of the most common cancerous tumors in a horse's eye. Fortunately, with early intervention it is often treatable and those tough decisions that sometimes have to be made, won't be until they are a ripe old age.

So please, think about prevention and be vigilant for early detection - your horse will love you for it.
